# Cue Bidding for Slam Exploration

# When Does A Cue Bid Show Slam Interest?

- After a major suit agreement at the three level, a new suit bid should be considered a cue bid.
  - -1 ♥ ... pass ... 3 ♥,,,pass ... 3 ♠ The 3 ♠ bid is a cue bid, showing first-round control of the spade suit and slam interest.
  - -1 ★ ... pass ... 3 ★ ... pass...4 ★ The 4 ★ bid is a cue bid showing-first round control of the club suit and slam interest.

# When Does A Cue Bid Show Slam Interest?

- After a major suit agreement at the two level, a new suit bid is usually a help-suit game try.
- After a minor suit agreement, a new suit bid is usually an attempt to get to a 3 nt game.
  - Such bids don't necessarily show first-round control but a stopper in the suit.
  - K Q 10, A J 9, Q J 10, etc.

# Key Card Is Not Always the Best Way to Begin Slam Exploration

- Cue bid when
  - You have good reason to think your side might have a slam.
  - You have a void (♠A Q 8 5 4
     ★K Q 3 ♣ \_\_\_\_\_)
  - You have a worthless doubleton (or more)
- You may be able to use blackwood with a worthless doubleton, if you have learned through cue bidding that partner has control of that suit.

# Cue Bids

- Cue bids are given up the line, with the most convenient suit shown first.
- When a player skips a suit in which she could cue bid, that player is saying, by inference, that she does not have a firstround control in the suit skipped.

# Cue Bids

- You cannot cue bid in the trump suit.
- A bid of the trump suit says.. "I have nothing further to add.
- If you need information about the quality of the trump suit, you must use Blackwood.
