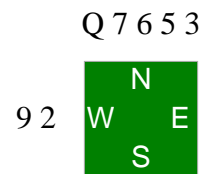

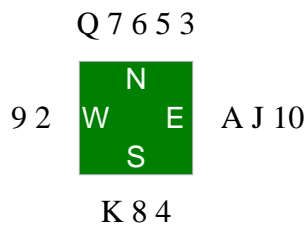

Not a lot we can say on this holding based on the honors

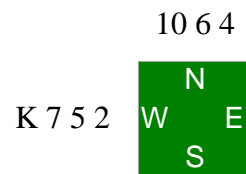
If East has the Ace, they should generally hold on to it when they can play a lower honor as a finesse. For instance if East had AJT then by playing the ten they are guaranteeing a second honor trick in the suit.

If South has the ace or the jack all of these cards are now equivalent because of the queen in dummy. Therefore they are free to play any of them.

However they play of the ten by East is potentially significant. Holding the ten, it makes little sense to play it over the 9 should East have a lower spot like the 2. Similarly from T8 it makes little sense to cover the 9 since East would like you to repeat the finesse if possible.

Assuming the 82 to be in South's hand, East has one of T, AT, JT or AJT. If some other suit is trump, then the 9 card fit seems less likely and hence the AJT seems most probable.

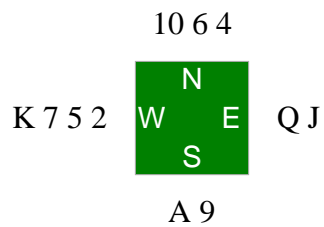
