Thoughts from Abroad

Imagine the scenario: someone out of the blue contacts your club wanting to know how to learn bridge with a view to joining the club. What would the response be?

- a) Sorry, you will have to go away and take some lessons and come back later (0/10)
- b) Sorry we do not offer lessons but we can refer you to someone who may be able to help (2/10)
- c) Sorry we do not offer lessons but we work with a local teacher who will be able to introduce you to the club when you are ready (6/10)
- d) Yes, we will be delighted to help. Please come along on Tuesday to discuss the options. We have courses starting two or three times a year (10/10)

Unfortunately (a) is all too common and (d) very rare, yet the first contact is overwhelmingly important – there may never be another opportunity.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if all clubs were teaching clubs at which learners and improvers were fully supported? The good news is that Somerset CBA has all the resources for you to set up such a programme and that these are available FREE to all our clubs.

So, what is the model?

1. Train the teacher.
2. Find the students.
3. Teach – if we don't teach them then who will?
4. Assist.
5. Integrate. The club is the heart of the bridge community.
6. Teach some more. Improving ability makes the game more pleasurable for all.

TAIT – That's all it takes!

Teacher training courses are free to EBU clubs and we have one starting in Nailsea in June. Lots of other courses are also available.

We can help with marketing your courses having run five in 2019 all of which have been fully subscribed.

We have a complete course of 31 lessons and associated resources available free of charge. These include teacher notes, student notes, a set of hands with curtain cards for student dealing as well as .pbn files for dealing machines, and quizzes.

Year two lessons will be available soon. During and after the course the students will play in assisted play groups and be gradually integrated into the main club. If the club is to benefit from this work in terms of increased and sustained membership then the link between the lessons and the club is imperative. Again, we can help.

We also have available the **FAST FORWARD TO BRIDGE** course for those who want to go that way. [Contact Ceri for details.](#)

I understand that there are difficulties with facility hire in our clubs none of whom own their own property but where there's a will Let's discuss and solve any problems before we give up.

We have learnt much from our work during the past two years and as a result now have a programme to offer which I hope will be of interest to your club. March 15th (Sunday) – **National Pairs** (Green pointed event) – Gypsy Hill Hotel, Exeter. A pairs event – two sessions of 24 boards commencing at 1pm. The top fifty pairs nationally will compete in a final event. Regional trophies and prizes as well. Further details and entry forms on the **Exeter Bridge Club** website.

Entries are now open for **Pairs League 2020**. For those who haven't played in this event before, pairs are allocated to divisions of a league and so are pitted only against pairs of similar ability and will never be out-gunned. The event takes place over 5 evenings (April 1st, 7th, 24th, 30th and May 4th) and pairs must commit to all 5 evenings or to arrange a reserve pair to stand in for them. Two matches of 12 boards are played on each evening and the event costs £25 per pair for the whole event.

It's a 'Play against the Experts' event in that scores are compared against those achieved by expert players in high level competition rather than those actually achieved in the room so players can see how their bidding and play compares with the best. An excellent way to learn and improve through play for all levels of player.

REPORTS

Tony Russ recently had the pleasure of playing in the second edition of the **Cannington Open Pairs**. This event was organised by Mike Cotterill and Steve Barham, was well attended and was enjoyed by a wide variety of Somerset players with a couple of guests from Wiltshire, Sue Hands and Brian Johnson the eventual winners. The SCBA was delighted to support this event and is very keen to back future initiatives of this sort which provide a stepping stone between club and county events. Forum for the Future (this is an abridged report the full text is available on the Somerset website)

On Monday 20th January the Somerset County Bridge Association put on an event hosted by Street bridge club for Somerset clubs (irrespective of EBU affiliation) to discuss the future. I was glad to attend as EBU Membership Development Officer, and to lead part of the discussion. Also in attendance were Jonathan Lilycrop (Club Liaison Officer) and Giles Ip (Youth Officer, English Bridge and Development). Around a dozen bridge clubs were represented. Tony Russ chaired and introduced the meeting.

Tony highlighted Frome and Street as being among the most successful clubs in the county (Street is not affiliated) because they welcome and teach novices. Frome has made a teaching effort and increased attendance by 62%. These are the exception, though. When he wrote to all the clubs about membership issue, only 12 of 36 replied. Very few clubs offer lessons, he said, and only 2 clubs offer assisted play. Many clubs will turn away absolute beginners.

Somerset has a two-year plan, he said, based on encouraging clubs to be able to offer lessons and reaching the point where an enquirer could call any club and it would be able to offer teaching and welcome. Clubs who do not have teachers, or want to train more, can send members on a teacher training course which is coming up in Nailsea in June. It is important that clubs run courses themselves, rather than simply referring enquirers to an external teacher, meaning that person will probably never come back to the club. New players need to be integrated into a club as quickly as possible.

In the discussion which followed there were several themes. A key issue is transition: how do you get novices from playing in gentle bridge sessions to the main club session or sessions? The EBU has thought a lot about this issue and has tips to share on its Membership Development site. It is important to avoid forming "clubs within clubs" that do nothing to sustain the main session. Mixed ability sessions are the answer for most clubs, including tolerance for mistakes or minor infractions made by novices. Jonathan at the EBU can advise on how to run movements where some players play fewer boards, or where beginners play in a parallel session. It is good to have beginners playing in the same room as the main session in order to integrate them with the club.

There was also discussion of the value of mentoring in all its guises. One club pairs up experienced players with beginners as a way of teaching. Having a host system is very helpful as way of increasing numbers since members know they will always get a game.

There was quite a bit of discussion about EBU affiliation with the main concern being the idea that EBU clubs are less friendly. I said that the EBU is changing and that a warm welcome to players of every standard is now a pillar of our approach and that we aim for all our clubs to offer this. Members from Castle Cary said that affiliation had not diminished the club's friendliness in any way.

Some clubs have struggled with EBU guidance for Facebook advertising. Help is available by contacting Tim or Jonathan at the EBU. We also talked about Nextdoor, which is a social media platform for near neighbours such as a housing estate or village. Clubs have found this very effective for marketing bridge course. Posting messages on Nextdoor is free and it is easier to use than Facebook.

Clubs are also anxious to support youth bridge even though this is unlikely to bring new members to most clubs in the short term. Giles spoke about what clubs can do to support bridge in schools and universities.

The bottom line: all bridge clubs need to gear up to teach and welcome novices, if they have not done so already. It works, it is hugely worthwhile, and remember – That's All It Takes!

Ask Jack - 'Should East have switched?'

An interesting deal turned up in the 18th Champions cup in Bucharest. While England beat Monaco 51:30 in one semi-final, BC't Onstein 1 beat Canottieri Olona 70:45 despite losing 11 imps here.

At table 1, 3 NT was made after West led the 5 of hearts to the Ace, followed by the Jack. South simply held up the King until the 3rd round and East had no entries. At table 2 East led the 3 of spades to defeat the contract. Whatever North does, West has sufficient entries to enjoy their spades.

The 3 of spades lead at table 2 was easy to find since partner had bid spades but East at table 1 had a chance to switch after taking their Ace of hearts. It is clear that South must hold the King of hearts and, unless partner started with 4 hearts, East has no prospect of further heart tricks. West must hold length in spades since South bid 3NT with a poor heart stop rather than supporting North's spades suit implied by their double. Also, if anyone has entries it is West since East has none. Who can tell whether on average it is better to switch or continue hearts though?

Jack, the multiple world champion computer bridge program can. According to Jack, it is worth switching to the 3 of spades at this point, even though partner has not bid spades. After dealing and analysing 1000 hands, all consistent with the above bidding, Jack thinks that switching to the 3 of spades is the best chance you have of defeating the contract. In this particular deal, the switch is too late to defeat the contract if your declarer play is as good as Jack's. By running 5 diamond tricks and never touching clubs he must make his contract. Any attempt to play on the club suit before taking all 5 diamonds results in the

contract failing, however, and I am sure many of us might make this mistake holding King, Jack and ten and only needing one trick.

The moral of this story, always consider how to find ways of establishing tricks for partner when you have poor prospects for yourself.
