A hand is said to be played double dummy if everyone can choose the cards they play with full knowledge of all four hands. So, for instance, declarer need never lose a finesse to a singleton King offside, because it's clear to all the Ace will drop the King.

This newsletter, we have our second Double Dummy Prize Puzzle. On the newly-minted Timbo's DD Grading Scale of GENTLE - TRICKY - TOUGH, I'd rate this one as a GENTLE (with the March one – see below – being a TRICKY). So, although entries from all Surrey members will be warmly welcomed, we're limiting the prize to those of NGS rating Jack or below. If you'd like to be considered for the prize, please include your NGS rating when you enter. Names of all those submitting correct-first-time solutions will be put in a Morris dancing hat and the winner selected randomly. We also had correct entries from Roger Eddleston (who was the fastest of all), John Dagnall, Richard Granville, Graham Sadie (who also laid out his solution beautifully), Martin Camina, Roy Westwater and Derek Duerden. William Clennell and Bomi Kavarana were near-misses.

For the last three years I've been working with the well-known writer David Burn to develop a new bidding system, which we've christened MOSSO. Some of you will have played against the system in club, county and national events.

But what's the system about? And how should I defend against it?

MOSSO is essentially an amalgam of three bidding systems: Two-over One, Fantunes and Polish Club. Starting with the revolutionary Fantunes system we stripped out much of the complexity and replaced these parts of the system with a more logical approach based upon Two-over One and Polish Club. The interfaces between these system components work very well and MOSSO may be played effectively with various degrees of sophistication.

All provided two course lunches and coffees at very special rates for charity (Pizza Express making no charge whatsoever). The Bush Hotel additionally catered for all those with special allergies, a far from simple task. The very special support from the staff of all these venues is much appreciated.

Samaritans is a unique charity, bringing hope to life and dedicated to reducing feelings of isolation and disconnection that can lead to suicide. Every six seconds, they respond to a call for help. Each year, they answer more than five million calls for help. The Farnham bridge playing community is proud to support such a worthy cause.

OUT OF HAND

" Our bridge teacher says you're to make the opening lead face down! "

The transition from learning Bridge, to playing duplicate Bridge at a club, can be a daunting step.

There are the protocols to remember – when to use the Stop and Alert cards, when to announce a bid, making the opening lead face down, and that is just the start! The pace of play initially – 24 boards in 3 hours – can be quite challenging for a new player.

A stepping stone is playing in a Supervised or Gentle duplicate session, where fewer boards are played in an evening, giving the player more time to bid and play (and think!). Any Bridge player, who has had around two terms of learning Bridge, or who knows how to play but has not tried Duplicate play, will be ready for Gentle Duplicate. Bridge clubs are getting friendlier in terms of welcoming and supporting new players and several offer regular gentle duplicate sessions.

One such club is the Fun2Play Bridge club (for Fun2Play site, click [here](#)), run by a local Bridge Teacher, Meena Samani. The sessions are held on the first three Monday evenings of the month at Imber Court, Ember Lane, Thames Ditton, KT8 0BT.

A friendly and welcoming environment is provided, and there is a bar, if sustenance is required! The session starts at 7:30pm and 18 boards are played, finishing at around 10:15pm.

For new players, this is the ideal way to practice and get an understanding of duplicate scoring and tactics. The results and hand records are published on the website and new players are encouraged to review their results with their partner, to see how the hands could have been bid or played better. Meena is happy to provide a post-game review if required.

To provide players with more opportunities to play gentle duplicate during the week, the Fun2Play Bridge, and other, players can also play at [Walton and Hersham Bridge Club](#) on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday evenings of the month. Steve Foster, the Manager of the club, runs these sessions in parallel with the main club session (for more information, click [here](#)).

After a period of play at a gentle duplicate club, it will be a small jump, rather than a leap, for players to join the main sessions at the club and try sessions at other clubs. [Ditton Bridge Club](#) and [Cobham Heath Bridge Club](#) offer a free play session for new players to the club, and of course there are very many other clubs in Surrey. Do try these gentle sessions.... An opportunity to gain greater confidence, make new friends and above all, to have some fun!

Leatherhead Bridge Club

Leatherhead BC responded positively to the EBU call to initiate training programmes in the search for new members. Instead of concentrating on beginners, the club has targeted improvers. Experience at recent Newcomers' Evenings had suggested there are a number of people who already play bridge socially, but lack the confidence to join a bridge club. Lack of speed to keep up with an evening of Duplicate, even more than a lack of skill or knowledge of conventions, was holding them back.

The first course of 10 Friday evenings saw 12 people sign up. Leatherhead member, John Cumming, devised and led the teaching. The last two sessions were No Fear evenings at the club when students were partnered by mentor members. "These were very valuable," explained John, "because they gave a gentle introduction into the main body of the club. They were also great fun and enjoyed by students and members alike." One of the students, at the end of the evening, stood up to thank the members and called them "a wonderfully friendly group of people."



Recruitment for the first session was by leafleting and some advertising in local magazines. There is a momentum building up as 18 students have registered for the second term without the need for any advertising. Club members are responding positively by bringing in friends and family members. There has been a real change in the atmosphere. Advertising has already been booked for the Autumn series of lessons. The end of each season of lessons will be marked by more No Fear evenings, a sort of Passing Out Parade, and also a way of easing the students into club evenings. Finding more members for club evenings is the objective of the exercise and it seems to be paying off successfully.

Leatherhead BC has enthusiastically taken training to its heart. Three members have now taken the EBU Teacher Training Course. Largely they are assisting John and are much needed with the higher than expected enrolment of students. In addition, Graham Cunningham is planning a series of Advanced Seminars later this year with the aim of improving the average club player. The trial session is planned for July.
