We have, in the WBL, a severe shortage of volunteers, which is reaching crisis proportions. The problem is particularly evident in the area of hospitality at sectionals. We all so fondly remember Nadine and Kitty, who worked tirelessly to provide their famous Washington hospitality and who recruited so many faithful volunteers to help with cooking, shopping, transporting supplies, and other tasks. Nadine and Kitty were unique, irreplaceable; their leadership in developing a network of volunteers has no parallel. But they are gone, and without their leadership, the network of volunteers has dissolved. In the absence of volunteer participation, we must rely more and more on commercial sources, which are more expensive and may not be as satisfactory. Eventually this will mean that we will either have to raise entry fees at the sectionals, or reduce hospitality.

For now, our Unit Game is making up for the losses incurred at our sectionals, and for that we must thank Chris Miller, our Unit Game Manager. Chris, with his real-life business background, has designed a model for running the Unit Game and our sectionals that works extremely well and cuts costs while providing full service. On the other side of the river, the NVBA has found it necessary to increase Unit Game entry fees; we hope not to do that for some time. But we need cooperation from the players to help out Directors and Tournament Chairmen: by picking up trash from around the tables at the end of each session; at the end of a Unit Game or Tournament, folding up bidding boxes; at the end of a sectional helping fold chairs and load tables.

Your help makes a big difference. Thanks in advance.

You can pick up a copy of the problems at the WBL Unit Game in Maryland, and can send answers or requests for problems to robinswr@erols.com. You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that

answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

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these conventions as well. • LPBC teaches you and allows you to practice responses and rebids for conventions, while Learn Conventions does not offer practice of responses and rebids for conventions. • **LPBC 2** and **3** are also availabe. They each contain seven convtions.

This problem was not worded well but I will attempt to make my feelings known about doubles of 4 ♠. Suppose I held ♠J1098xxxx $\forall xxx \Rightarrow x \Rightarrow x$. If I am non-vulnerable and the opponents are vulnerable, I could easily open 4 ♠. To stop me from stealing from you, you should play penalty doubles when you're vulnerable and I'm not. If you hold ♠AOx♥A ♦Kxxxx ♣Axxx you should double 4♠ without worrying about your partner bidding 5 ♥. At other vulnerabilities you'd have to worry about partner bidding $5 \, \mathbf{V}$, since double of $4 \, \mathbf{A}$ is more takeout than penalties. If you double and it's for takeout and partner has a singleton spade, he should go out of his way to pull your double. If they're vulnerable you have less to worry about an opponent opening 4 \(\blacktrian \) on garbage. The 4 \(\infty \) opener is probably very sound and is more likely to make. Therefore, if you have a good fit, you could easily take nine tricks which would be a good save against $4 \, \clubsuit$.

Five experts double at all vulnerabilities. Since lots of players play the double as a takeout double, their partner might pull the double to $5 \, \checkmark$.

Adams: "1—Partner will not bid without a long suit and a decent hand."

Parker: "1—Double all vulnerabilities. I just have too good a hand to pass. Partner will pass unless he has lots of distribution."

Woolsey: "1—My double is penalties, and I don't think they are making, so not a problem."

Theurer: "1—Double at all vulnerabilities - at the table, some of this would depend on knowing the preempt style of my opponents. Lacking that, this hand is typical of why "preempts work". I will double all the time since I expect partner to pass often unless he has a long suit, and have plenty of prime values that should take tricks."

Two experts pass at favorable and double otherwise. If they're vulnerable and you're not vulnerable, the 4 \(\blacktriangle \)-opener figures to be strong, not some random opener. Therefore you want to double for takeout.

Schwartz: "7—Pass at favorable. Double

otherwise .I usually pass hands with pure defense, but I have enough outside of spades so if partner pulls with a distributional hand, I might make at the five-level. More likely partner will pass and we are likely to beat it at least one. I pass at favorable as willing to collect a 100 or 200 and not have to worry about partner pulling with a weak distributional hand afraid of a make by them."

Shi: "7—Pass when we are white and they are red, double at all other colors. Partner likely to have less at those colors, and missing a game is not such a big deal. Generally I'm fine with playing doubles as more penalty the more favorable they are and more takeout the more unfavorable they are also, and don't necessarily want partner to struggle to respond to a takeout double."

One expert allows his opponents to steal from him.

Hopkins: "6—Pass always."

If you're vulnerable and they're not vulnerable play double of $4 \triangleq$ as penalties. If they're vulnerable and you're not, then play double of $4 \triangleq$ as takeout. At equal vulnerabilities it's probably best to play the double as takeout.

We have a good hand but we don't have any aces. However, partner could have ♠QJ432 ♥xxx ♦43 ♣AKQ and we might only make 2 ♠. The way we find out if partner has at least two non-club aces is to jump to 4 ♣. 4 ♣, a splinter, shows four-card spade support, a game-forcing hand with club shortness. If partner signs-off in 4 ♠, we can't have a slam. If partner has two aces, with one of them red, he CAN'T sign-off in 4 ♠. With ♠AJxxx ♥Axx ♦xx ♣Kxx, he must bid 4 ♥. Bidding 4 ♥ does not commit us to slam.

Six experts join me and splinter.

Parker: "4. —Splinter. It is always best to set the trump suit early. Hopefully partner cue bids four-of-a-red-suit next."

Theurer: "4♣—Best to show my club shortness and four+ trumps immediately so that partner can evaluate. This bid is also good in that it allow partner to cuebid either 4♦ or 4♥, or to take control and ask for keycards, or to sign off with a minimum range hand with club wastage."

Schwartz: "4♣—Leaves open an easy four-level red suit cue bid."

Hopkins: "4.—I might get some cooperation immediately from partner and then I can force some by making my next bid 5...
If I were confident it wouldn't be misread, I would have started with exclusion."

Adams: "4♣—Will respect signoff, or bid 5♣ exclusion over a cue-bid."

It makes sense to play that a splinter such as 4.4 followed by 5.4 should show a void in the splinter suit and ask for keycards outside the suit. It makes more sense to always play 5.4 asking for keycards outside of the splinter suit no matter what the short splinter suit was.

Shi: "4♣—Partner will have room to cooperate with 4♦ or 4♥.trump queen to give a try so if they bid 4♠ I will respect their signoff."

One expert bids shows a four-card balanced raise. Suppose his partner jumps to 4 ♠. He will not know if partner holds ♠QJ432 ♥xxx ♦xx ♣AKQ or ♠Axxxx ♥Axx ♦Ax ♣xxx. He'll jump to 4 ♠ on both hands.

Lublin: "2NT—I bid Jacoby 2NT."

What would you bid holding ♠x ♥-♦xx ♣KQJ10xxxxxx over 1 ♠? I'd jump to 5 ♣, Hopefully you have rules.

Woolsey: "5.—I assume this is exclusion. If not, then whatever route I have for exclusion in my partnership is what I want to do. What could be more perfect than this hand?"

It's always best if you can show shortness with support ASAP.

How much is your hand worth? What do need to make a $\triangle xx \lor Qxx \lor QJ10xx \angle xxx$ is a minimum and you could usually make 5♣. He could have the same hand with the ace of diamonds and you would usually make 6.4. How do you find out if partner has zero or if he has 11? First of all you never assume that partner as zero or 11. The assumption is that he has either four or nine. A double here is flexible and when in doubt you want to make the bid that is most flexible. Double allows partner to pass with four good hearts. Double allows partner to bid 3♠ which shows a bad hand with nothing more to say. Double allows partner to cuebid with a reasonably good hand.

Three experts jump to 5. All this shows is that you were ready for partner to bid spades. You could be gambling on making 5. Same hand without the king of diamonds and the queen of clubs.

Woolsey: "5♣—With virtually eleven tricks in my own hand. I don't see how I can do less. If partner has a heart stopper and 3NT makes, that is just too bad — I don't see how to get there sensibly."

You'll get there sensibly if you double 3 ♥ and partner bids 3NT,

Hopkins: "5♣—RHO took away my 3♥ cue-bid and I don't want to imply big Diamond support so I am bidding what I think I can make."

Schwartz: "5 - Shows close to eleven tricks when partner can have nothing, making six easier to bid."

One expert takes a giant underbid. All you need is for partner to have the jack of spades and the ace of diamonds onside to have a play for $5 \, \clubsuit$.

Shi: "4.—Doubling again seems wrong with this playing strength and shape."

Two experts join me and double. This wins big time if the opponents are crazy and partner has four good hearts. It also wins when if partner holds ♠76 ♥xxx ♦QJ109xxx ♣x and can insist on playing in diamonds. If partner bids 3NT, that would be good also.

Adams: "Double—Best chance to see if partner has any life. If I get partner to bid 3NT I can pull to 4. and have it be forcing."

Theurer: "Double—This is actually a bit easier when RHO bids 3♥. I may still have a problem after partner bids since even with this second takeout double I don't promise quite this much strength. But let's see what partner bids and worry about my next call that. At matchpoints I need to keep 3NT in the picture here."

One expert asks for aces. I hope his partner is not 3=3=6=1.

Parker: "4NT—Assuming I am not playing 1430, otherwise 4. If partner has one ace I can bid 6. If he has zero keycards, I can pass 5."

Takeout doubles are flexible.

What doesn't partner have for his $3 \spadesuit$ -bid? He doesn't have three-card heart support since he didn't raise hearts. He doesn't have two spade stoppers since he didn't bid 2NT. Since he bid only $3 \spadesuit$, he probably has a minimum hand. $\triangle xx \forall xx \land KOJxxx \triangle AOx$ is a reasonable 3 ♦-call. If he has a minimum, nine tricks in diamonds could easily be the limit. This is matchpoints where plus scores are valuable. Even if partner has $\triangle Axx \lor xx \lor KQJxxx \angle Qx$, a good diamond suit and a spade stopper, 3NT won't make. $\triangle Qxx \forall xx \land KQJxxx \triangle Ax$ will make 3NT if East has all the missing honors but he would have bid 2NT instead of $3 \spadesuit$.

One expert joins me and passes.

Woolsey: "Pass—Partner needs running diamonds, a spade stopper, and another ace to make 3NT. If he has that, he probably would have done more than a non-forcing $3 \spadesuit$."

Seven experts reach for the sky with six of them forcing partner to make a decision. Partner's most likely continuation is to bid 3NT if he thinks that's best. Since he already denied good spades, I don't think he needs a full spade stopper to bid 3NT. I'd bid 3NT holding Qx or Jxx of spades.

Parker: "3 \(\times \)—Asking for two hearts or a spade stopper."

Lublin: "3 ♠—I bid 3 ♠ looking for notrump and then if no spade stopper bid 5♦."

Theurer: "3♠—Somewhat similar theme as problem three - need to keep 3NT in the picture at matchpoints, partner should realize that for now I'm still looking for the best game and that I have a full opening bid which 2♥ did not promise."

know that an opening bid opposite an opening bid does not mean that you can make game.

Hopkins: "3 ♠—Given the relatively quiet opponents, partner rates to have a Spade stopper. My real question is whether we can get out in 4♦ if partner says no."

Give partner $\triangle Qx \lor Qx \land Kxxxxx \triangle AQx$ and you'll end up minus.

Adams: "3♠—Punishing partner for opening. Maybe we can make something. A stray Ox of hearts makes 4♥ playable."

This is matchpoints so you don't have to punish partner for opening.

One expert rebids his five-card suit.

Schwartz: "3♥—Seems like a good hand to go for the 5-2 and avoid blindly forcing to game. Even if partner has a spade stopper, lack of outside aces might give 3NT no play."

Since you don't have an eight-card majorsuit fit, you need extra values to make game.

have the worst possible takeout double. However, raising if RHO passes does show extras. *Is this hand worth double followed by 2♣? Is* this hand worth a raise to 2 ? Takeout doubles usually show support for unbid majors. Therefore, if you bid 2♣ partner should expect that you have a hand similar to this. 2.4 shows five clubs, three spades and between 17 and 21 HCP. With more you'd cue bid.

Two experts raise spades. 2 ♠ could be a silly contract. Partner would love playing 2 A holding ♠xxx ♥xxxxx ♦xxx ♣xx. However, 2 \(\text{does show at least 16 points.} \)

Theurer: "2♠—I might have overcalled 2♣ then if it goes 2♥ passed back to me I can double, but doubling is okay I guess. But now I have a problem - I can pass here which works when partner is on the minimum side for his 1 \(\blacktriangle \)-bid. But he can have a hand just short of a 2 -bid and now we might miss a vulnerable game at IMPs. 24 here should show a hand too good to overcall 2. initially, which I don't really have. So I will lie and bid 2♠ which is a spade short but comes closer to describing my overall strength."

Shi: "2 ♠—Both pass and 2 ♠ are on the radar for me. Don't think I'm good enough for 2♥. I would pass at matchpoints. If I bid 2♠ partner can still suggest no trump."

If you bid 2 \(\blacktriangle \), he'll assume that you have four spades.

Two experts join me and give partner an out if he has a very bad hand and bad spades. If partner has five spades he'll rebid them. If he only has four spades, he'll bid again if he has

values or he's short in clubs and has diamonds.

Schwartz: "2♣—Even though partner seems likely to have help in hearts, 1NT now overstates the hand. 2 v commits to spades unnecessarily."

Woolsey: "2♣—Looks like a perfect description of the hand — three-card spade support, club suit, extras."

Two experts cue bid possibly forcing partner to rebid his three-card spade holding.

Parker: "2♥—shows a good hand and probably three spades. I will pass any bid by partner except 3♦, which I will correct to 3♠."

If partner bids 3 ♦, he can't have five spades but might have five diamonds.

Hopkins: "2♥—I believe most play this as an 18-19 three-card raise initially and so respond appropriately."

One expert passes $1 \, \clubsuit$.

Lublin: "Pass—I would pass and then raise spades over opponents bid."

One expert overbids. Since a 1NT-overcall shows 15-18, doubling and rebidding 1NT shows 19-21.

Adams: "1NT-Right on values and shape. Light on stopper, but does not commit us to notrump."

How bad can bidding 2♣ be? It shows at least five clubs, at least 17 HCP and tolerance for spades.



WBL EDUCATION FOUNDATION'S BRIDGE IN SCHOOLS PROGRAM IS UP AND RUNNING

Students at two local high schools are playing regularly, University of Maryland students are doing the same and a bridge day camp is in the planning stages for the coming summer.

All programs are supported by fundraising done by the WBL Education Foundation. Adam Gann, the coordinator of the Bridge in Schools program, calls it "an exciting first year."

At Sidwell Friends School in Washington and Walter Johnson High School in Bethesda, students play once a week under the supervision of volunteers trained by the Foundation. Games take place during lunch. Sidwell and WJ players expect to represent their schools at an interscholastic bridge match later this year. It might take place at the North American Bridge Championships, scheduled for Washington in July.

At Maryland, youth bridge star Hakan Berk has supervised more than a dozen players each week throughout the 2015-16 school year. He began as soon as he arrived on campus as a freshman last fall. The Maryland squad hopes to take part in next year's Collegiate Bridge Championships.

Meanwhile, the Bethesda-Chevy Chase YMCA is working closely with the Foundation to plan and launch a bridge day camp for local students this summer. How often bridge camp would meet, and what ages the players would be, remains to be decided. Gann hopes that campers will want to continue playing once they return to school in the fall, and will spearhead the development of new programs at their schools in the coming academic year.

We won the event, certainly with little thanks to my own contributions. After that, every time I played against the woman who was from royalty, I never heard the end of how lucky I was. Which was true: I was lucky in finding that Swedish partner."

When Tom returned from Europe, he played twice in duplicate tournaments with a friend. Today, Tom looks for partners who enjoy humor, who like to laugh at the table. Bridge is a lot more fun for him when there is laughter. And, Tom says if you can teach him a few new conventions, he'd be grateful!

It was a great day for Sheila and the Forsythes suggested that she come to the basement game at Christ the King Church, where the Forsythes gave a lesson followed by 12 hands with guidance during the play. After a few months in the basement, Sheila met her boyfriend, Mike, with whom she came out of the basement and played at the real duplicate game upstairs at the church. After retirement from her job as an attorney for the District of Columbia, she got more involved with bridge. Sheila says, "There are so many games to play and so many great opponents!"

Michael Kuehl came from a bridge family. His parents, both of whom were Life Masters, directed two duplicate games in Park Ridge, Illinois.



Michael and his younger brother started playing duplicate bridge in 1955, when he was a sophomore in high school, and at that time even played in a National Tournament in Chicago with their parents. He played bridge occasionally in college, but stopped playing when he went to medical school and then pursued a career as a medical researcher until he retired early in 2015. (Michael's brother, Bill Kuehl, continued playing duplicate bridge; he ultimately became a Life Master and a top player in St. Louis where he directed a duplicate game for many years before retiring from bridge so that he could spend more time with his wife and children.)

Nearly 50 years after Michael stopped playing bridge, he decided to join the ACBL and play duplicate bridge once or twice a week in the Washington area. He was amazed at how much the bidding has changed in the past 50 years! Michael continues to have the same goals in playing this fascinating game. First, trying to be a supportive partner. Second, trying to improve by reading bridge books and pursuing discussions with bridge experts and his partners. Finally, enjoying the experience of playing with others as a partner, teammate, and also as an opponent.



David Marshall is married to Linda (WBL Vice President) and they have two sons, Adam (25), and Josh (22). David is an attorney employed by a U.S. government agency.

He previously worked in the private sector as an attorney for various law firms. He earned a B.A. from Denison University, and his J.D. from the University of Michigan. His hobbies include movies, genealogy, and gardening.

David started playing bridge as a fresh-

man in his high school lunch room, as he and three friends wanted something to occupy their time. Some upper class friends introduced them to the game at their request. David played in several club games during high school, then took a long hiatus from competitive bridge. He really started playing in tournaments when he returned to bridge 5 1/2 years ago. David's wish for his bridge future is simply to continue to enjoy the game.



Joy Oliver taught secondary math and science while she lived in North Carolina. She sponsored a bridge club for her students and then learned and instantly fell in love

with the game. Joy currently teaches piano and also enjoys sports.

Mike Watts was first introduced to bridge by running errands for his mother's bridge group. He would go to the store to get cigarettes for them and then sit in on a couple of hands - he's not sure why. When Mike got married, he played party bridge with his wife and other couples using the bridge wheel. Mike feels that this experience may have contributed to his divorce. In 1997, he took a beginning bridge course offered by the county and was "woefully underprepared in 2004 when Steve and Sandy Forsythe taught me the real game of bridge. They contradicted my mother who believed penalty doubles were rude. Had it not been for them, I would still be using the bridge wheel." Mike met his girlfriend Sheila at the table. He says, "My current partners Sheila, Mary and Jim are wonderful but constantly say things like "The 4 on the board was good" like I didn't know it already." Mike's favorite bridge expert is Frank Stewart. Mike says he still can't figure out Stewart's hands in the paper.



Let's look at a simple five board match between you and another team. First our scores:

Now let's compare and convert the score to see who won.

On board one, our team made one more trick than the opposition in the same contract. Adding the score at our table to the score at the other table yielded a net score of +30. (450-420). Referring to the IMP table converts this to one IMP for our team. On board two, the cumulative score was +10 (-90+100). For a difference of 10 points, there are no IMPS for either side. Similarly, we lost 8 IMPS on board 3 (+1100-1510=-410), won 13 IMPS on board 4 (200+620=820), and won 12 IMPS on board 5 (600+100=700). The final score of the match was 26 IMPS for our side and 8 IMPS for our side. Victory is ours!

There is one other aspect to IMPS scoring. In some events, particularly Swiss Teams, sometimes they are scored as IMPS converted to Victory Points (VP). On your convention card, there is a victory point scale on the side of your convention card. The most commonly used scale is the 20 VP scale shown below. Once you determine the final IMP score for your match, you can refer to this table to con-

Victory points are added up cumulatively, and are used at the end of the event to determine the winners.
