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## PRESIDENT'S LETTER

## REVIEW OF 2007

2007 was another good year for the WBL. Reversing the trend of recent years, our membership grew by a net of 36 people ( $2.64 \%$ ), the best in District 6 and in the top third of the ACBL. Attendance at both our sectionals and unit game remained strong. Our sectional attendance was almost 1600 tables, an increase of almost 100 over the previous year. Our unit game attendance did not do as well, falling from 2258.5 tables in 2006 to only 2162 in 2007. We have requested the church to make some improvements in the facilities that we use and will continue to pursue this issue. Our Round Robin and Unit KO events continued last year with participation about the same as the year before.

We remained strong financially with a positive cash flow of $\$ 5000$ and a treasury with adequate funds to see us into at least the near future with no increase in card fees.

One of the few negative aspects of the last year was losing Steve and Sandy Forsythe and all they had done to build our newcomer games. However, we are continuing their $0-20$ game on Thursday nights and this continues to feed new players into our non-life master game. In addition, we hope to restart the Sunday non-life master game they ran so successfully or find other opportunities to help develop our less experienced players and to continue their Instant Bridge Player programs that they started. It has taken a number of volunteers to step in to replace the two of them, and we are grateful for all who have helped out.

Our Bridge in Schools program continued
to make progress with a shift in focus to middle schools. Three middle schools and one high school had active bridge clubs at the end of the year and we were attempting to get into three or four more schools. We have had an adequate number of volunteer teachers, but finding students and willing schools has been a bigger bottleneck.

Our dealing machine has been repaired and is operating well. In addition, a number of other individuals and units are buying machines that we can use as backups if we have mechanical problems again. We will continue to try to upgrade the quality of the cards, boards and bidding boxes in the coming year.

We awarded the Machlin Sportsmanship Award to Peter Boyd. This is the second year of this award which we hope will encourage sportsmanship throughout the WBL.

Finally, I want to thank all of those who have worked so hard this past year for the WBL. Board members and other officers and officials, directors and caddies, tournament volunteers, and all the others whose efforts make the WBL what it is, you have my deepest gratitude and I hope that of all of the members. Let us all work together again this coming year to make 2008 another successful and enjoyable year for all of us.

Looking ahead to the future, our Annual Meeting will be held on May 15. I hope everyone can attend, enjoy the food, help with the election of next year's board and do what we like best, play bridge. I hope to see all of you there.

You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

The question is - do you let the opponents play at the two-level in an eight-card or longer fit? The Law of Total Tricks says that that would be violation. How can you know how many hearts the opponents have? Partner made a takeout double. The only time he would make an off shape double is if he had a strong hand. Since he passed $2 \boldsymbol{*}$, he can't have a strong hand. Therefore, he can't have four hearts. Not only can't he have four hearts, he has to have at least three clubs. How do we push the opponents?

Six experts bid 2^. Partner knows that we don't have four spades. If we had four spades, we would bid spades even if we had six clubs. The problem with bidding $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ is that partner will not know that you have five clubs. Give him $\uparrow \times x x x \geqslant x x \geqslant A K x x * A J x$ and he'll have no choice but to pass $2 \wedge$.

Parker: " $2 \wedge$-Too good a hand to pass. I am willing to play a $4-3$ with the tap in the three-card suit. Partner will correct to clubs if he only has three spades."

Adams: " $2 \boldsymbol{A}$-I denied four spades the first time, and I expect they will compete to $3 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$, so I simply do not have to worry about whether a $4-3$ will play well. This is about getting partner off the club lead against $3 \vee$

Abelow: " $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$-The $4-3$ fit may play well or push them to 3 where we can go plus."

Woolsey: " $2 \uparrow$-I'm never selling out to 2 when partner has made a takeout double
of hearts and I have a doubleton. Partner will be playing me for a three-card suit, as with four spades I would have bid 14 rather than $2 \boldsymbol{*}$. I expect to push them to $3 \boldsymbol{\square}$ and maybe get a plus score on defense."

Hopkins: " $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$-I wouldn’t mind playing an inverted $4-3$ fit, particularly if partner had
 And 3* isn't precluded."

Partner can’t have $\uparrow A J x x>x \diamond A K Q x x$ ヵ Kx . He would have bid $2 *$ over your $2 \star$.

Roman: " $2 \boldsymbol{n}$-As I will explain to my partner after this hand blows up, I can't possibly have four spades, because I didn't bid them the first time, so I'm just competing over 2 with three spades, two or fewer hearts, probably exactly five clubs, and marginal values since I didn't bid $3{ }^{\circ}$ the first time."

Two experts pass. Clear Law violation. If the opponents can make eight tricks in hearts and you can make nine tricks in clubs, you gain at least four IMPs by bidding. IMPs are won by competing as well as bidding and making games.

The following expert has it backwards. At matchpoints, the opponents are friskier with their penalty doubles in order to get the magic 200. At IMPs, they're won't double you to just to get +200 .

Landen: "Pass—At matchpoints I'd bid $2 \uparrow$ in a heartbeat, but at IMPs, vulnerable, I go quietly, perhaps timidly would be a better adjective.

King: "Pass-I don't usually like to sell out to two-of-a-major, but here it is not clear that they even have an eight-card fit. Also I don't think we can be sure of a nine-card club fit and bidding $2 \wedge$ to play the Moysian may not work well here."

The opponents must have an eight-card heart fit unless you're playing with a partner who makes a takeout double holding four hearts.

One expert doubles. That would be OK if you had the understanding that all doubles of low-level bids are for takeout. However, standard is that double of $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ should be for penalties. Couldn't East be balancing with two hearts with you holding six? If partner is void in hearts, the opponents could still have eight hearts and your hearts could be KQJ109. No need to make a takeout double in this situation.

Schwartz: "Double-Should not be penalty and enables us to get to the best fit at the appropriate level."

One expert agrees with me and makes a practical bid. Partner should have at least three clubs. If he were $4=2=5=2$, he should have bid $2 \star$ over your $2 \star$. $3 *$ will play better if partner has three good clubs and four bad
spades. Usually when you make an iffy bid, it's better that you do it directly and with conviction. You don't want your opponents to double you because they think you are guessing.

Cappelletti: " $3 *$-l'm sticking with my five-card suit - note that partner did not bid 2 over 2* ("equal level conversion") hence he should have three or more clubs. If I had only four clubs then I would fish in with the three-card spade suit.'

Don't let the opponents play in an eightcard fit at the two-level.

You have almost game in hand. Give part-
 $4 \boldsymbol{\text { has excellent chances. If that's all it takes }}$ to make game, you want to be in game. Seven experts bid 3*. Wouldn't partner pass 3* with the above hand? Suppose partner has $\uparrow$ QJxx xx xx* Qxxxx? If the opponents bid 4*, he'll bid $5 *$. Notice that you have three losers in clubs and three losers in hearts. However, three tricks defeat 5 * but not $4 \boldsymbol{v}$. How do you show a strong hand with spade support? With three-card support you make a support double and then bid again. With four-card support, you make the same bid as if East had passed. Therefore a cue bid in this situation tends to deny spade support.

One expert agrees with me and makes a forcing bid. A cue bid by opener when partner has not shown a strong hand shows a strong hand. This is not a Western Cue Bid. $3 \downarrow$ means that we are going to game but I might not be sure which game or I might be thinking about slam.

Roman: " 3 -This shows a strong hand, but not a spade raise. If I had a spade raise, I would bid some number of spades or splinter in diamonds if I had that. I play that $4 *$ is the only splinter available here. Second choice would be $4 \star$, but with this hand, I want to try to leave
partner room to bid $3 \boldsymbol{\sim}$ or rebid spades."
One expert makes sure that game is reached.

Adams: " $4 \cup$-Seems like a good place for a gadget, I just do not know what that gadget is, so take the practical route."

The gadget is the cue bid.
Seven experts bid $3 \boldsymbol{\star}$. If $3 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$ was forcing, I might bid $3{ }^{*}$ but it would be silly to play this hand in $3 *$. If I was going to bid some number of clubs, I would bid $4 \boldsymbol{*}$, forcing, which ensures that we get to game. Since the object is to compete with distributional hands, couldn't you bid 3* holding as little as $\uparrow \mathrm{xx} \mathrm{KJxxx}_{\mathrm{x}} \boldsymbol{\mathrm { x }} \mathrm{AQJxx}$ ?

Parker: " $3 *$ - Shows a good hand and distribution. The opponents will probably bid a high number of diamonds next. I will bid 4 over 4 . No need to jump to $4 \downarrow$ now since it will close out the bidding. Partner can have as little as $\uparrow \mathrm{Axxx}_{\mathrm{xx}}^{\mathrm{x}} \mathrm{xx} \boldsymbol{\mathrm { x }} \mathrm{Kx}$ and we have a slam."

If partner has $\uparrow A Q x x x \geqslant x \geqslant x x x \nLeftarrow K x x$, $3 \%$ will end the auction.

Abelow: "3*-Assuming it will not go all pass, I will have chance to hear another bid from partner- all three suits are still alive. 3 would imply spade support."

When partner has shows strength, cue bids show support. Here, however, the cue bid denies support.

Woolsey: " $3 \boldsymbol{*}$ - There is a slight risk it will go all pass and we miss a game, but I'll bet against that happening. Otherwise, it could be very important for me to bid the club suit, both for competitive reasons and for slam purposes if partner has a good hand."

Landen: " $3 *$ - I will definitely get another chance to bid, so I'll start with $3{ }^{*}{ }^{\circ}$ and hope to be able to bid $4 \checkmark$ later. Who knows, clubs is where we might belong. If I had only one bid, it would be $4 \bullet$."

Schwartz: "3*-4 is the most likely game but bidding it now will make it much more difficult to get to slam."

Hopkins: "3*-I really can't think of another bid. I think this positions us well for the remainder of the auction, whereas $2 v$ hides the other major feature of my hand."

Cappelletti: " $3 *$-No rush (yet) - let's hear more from partner. $7 \boldsymbol{*}$ could be the best contract."

King: " $3 \mathbf{V}$-I want to emphasize hearts before introducing clubs and this hand has such great playing strength that a jump is warranted."

After a one-level response, a cue bid shows a strong hand usually without primary support.

You're in third seat, have close to an opening bid and have a suit that you want led. I can't think of any reason not to open $1 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$. Partners a passed hand so you can pass any natural bid he makes. I did open $1 \mathbf{v}$ and my LHO started thinking. Actually he overcalled 1s but I wondered what would I have done if he had overcalled 2 and partner made a negative double, which brings us to this problem. There is no good solution so which bad solution do we pick. Usually in these situations it's best to make the bid that has the most to gain. In this case passing has the best upside. The good news is that partner has shown shortness in your strongest suit. Give partner as little as $\uparrow A x x-\operatorname{xx} \uparrow Q x x x$ and with luck you could take the first six tricks.

Five experts join me and try to take six tricks on defense.

Adams: "Pass-They are in two-of-thesuit I should have opened. What can I do?"
Two-of-the-suit you would have opened in first or second chair assuming you open 11-counts. I can't think of any reason to open 1 in third chair.

Woolsey: "Pass-It will be a lot easier to take six tricks than eight or more. If they make 2 doubled so what - it's only - 180 . I don't expect to go plus declaring."
-180 doesn't figure to lose many IMPs.
Landen: "Pass-Hope they don't make overtricks. Passing is safer than bidding as partner might not be able to take a joke. On a good day, we'll beat 2 -maybe partner will score his Jack of trumps from Jx."

Schwartz: "Pass-By far the best chance for a plus score and if they make its not game. At least I probably directed the best lead."

The main reason to open $1 \boldsymbol{V}$ was for the lead.
Roman: "Pass-Because all other calls are simply impossible. Maybe declarer will misplay trumps. Maybe the heart lead I've arranged for will actually beat them, maybe minus 180 or 380 or 580 is the best I can do at this point."

Five experts try to guess where they
belong. If they guess wrong, their minus could be a lot larger than 2 -doubled making. If the cards are such that $2 \star$ make, bidding will be worse.

One expert hopes his partner has five clubs. Abelow: " 30 -Having the 1 bid foisted on me (would I have passed 1n by partner), I'm am stuck looking at a big negative number. I am tempted to shoot out $2 \star$ doubled, hoping that -180 is the best we can do but partner may be $2=4=2=5$ and clubs may be ok."

Four experts rebid their four-card suit.
King: " $2 \boldsymbol{v}$-I am tempted to pass, but that could easily be -380. Any bid lies by at least one card in length, and this is the cheapest one."

Parker: " $2 \boldsymbol{v}$-I can hear the abstainers now. I would never open $1 \boldsymbol{V}$. Lets play a 4 2 fit and hope they don't lead trump."

If you don't open this hand $\mathbf{l V}$ in third seat, you don't understand third-seat openings.

Abstainers don't win bidding contests.
Hopkins: " $2 v$-Well, I made my bed so I am going to lie in it. It might even turn out that our possible $4-2$ fit plays well if they let me get a ruff in dummy or that we might take eight tricks in the majors if the defense leads trumps."

Cappelletti: "2 -Least of evils? I'm already in trouble - maybe I won't get doubled if opponents think I have a good heart suit."

If you have a minimum opener, you are allowed to open a four-card suit in third or fourth chair. Holding $\uparrow A K Q \times x \times x \geqslant x x \neq x x x$, open 14 and pass any natural bid partner makes. If you have enough strength to take a second bid, make your normal opener.

If partner has the $J$ and the club finesse works, you can very likely make $5 \downarrow$. However, LHO has made a gambling type bid. The question is - do you try to ring the bell or do you make a conservative bid. Doubling 4A rings the bell when partner has spade strength. Bidding 4NT or 5 is the conservative bid. Just like problem
three, going for the throat has the biggest upside.
Five experts join me and go for the throat. Partner will look at his spades and decide what to do. West has made a gambling bid and his spades are not always solid and even solid spades lose tricks when they don't split. If partner has J10xxx behind West's AKQxxxx, he'll get two trump tricks. Or partner has Q10xx of spades behind West's AKJ9xxx. Double of 4^ tells partner that you have defense along with your minors.

Parker: "Double-It's a bidders game. My double shows a good unusual notrump and defense. If partner passes he cannot expect more than this. If he bids we will do fine."

King: "Double—This should say I have a very good hand with some potential for both offense and defense."

Double is flexible. If partner happens to hold $\uparrow Q_{x x} \operatorname{xxxxx}^{\mathrm{x}} \mathrm{xx} \mathrm{xx}$, he can pass the double and on good days take four tricks on defense. On fair days, you'll be -790 and tie the opponents who get to five-of-a-minor doubled and go for 800 .

Schwartz: "Double—Prefer one less diamond but with unknown fit have to leave partner a chance to defend. Also there is no clear way to get to the best minor."
Hopkins: "Double-I have the Aces in my suits. Partner should be well-placed to judge to sit or push on."

Roman: "Double-Partner, remember a moment ago when I told you I had both minors? Well I also have a good hand."

Five experts give up the possibility of a number.

Three experts bid 5 . Couldn't partner have $\boldsymbol{\uparrow} \operatorname{xxx} \boldsymbol{x x x x x} \times \mathrm{x} \cdot \mathrm{Kxx}$ where $5 \boldsymbol{*}$ is cold and 5 needs a 3-3 diamond break.

Adams: " 5 - I'd like to double, but concerned that would be penalty asking for a heart lead. Seems like 5 should have a play."

Abelow: " 5 -A major suit ace or the Jack of diamonds and two or three diamonds in partners hand will give me a play for 5 4 NT will get us to the wrong minor too often, pass is too likely to be a double game swing."

Landen: " 5 -I don't need much from partner for this to make. Double is misguided, too much offense and no major suit defense."

Two experts bid 4NT. You have two ways to show both minors - 4NT and 5\&. 4NT shows longer diamonds, $5 \boldsymbol{*}$ shows longer clubs or equal minors. Therefore the correct bid with six diamonds and five clubs is 4NT. With six clubs and five diamonds, bid $5 \%$. With equal minors, bid 5\%.

Woolsey: "4NT—This should emphasize diamonds, while $5 \%$ should emphasize clubs. I'm not doubling and giving partner an impossible problem when I virtually have five-of-a-minor in my own hand."

Cappelletti: "4NT—5* emphasizes clubs - then 4NT emphasizes diamonds."

When faced with choices, make the most flexible.

The methods that I have given you are not standard. They are transfer responses after partner has overcalled one-of-a-major and RHO makes a negative double. Transfers give you a way to show both a good three-card raise and a bad three-card raise. A direct raise shows a weak three-card raise usually 3-7 points. Bidding one-under partner's suit, in this case 2 , shows a good three-card raise usually 7-10 points. Transferring into their suit (1N1) shows a three-card limit raise or better. 2* show diamonds and redouble show a two-card limit raise or better. Seven and ten point raises can go either way. With four-card support, 3 show a preemptive raise, jump cue (3*) shows a 7-9 raise and 2 NT shows a limit raise or better. I gave you these methods so you could show dif-ferent-strength heart raises. I assumed that the $2 \boldsymbol{e}$ answers was a three-card limit raise. I wanted was to know where you thought this hand fell given this system. West opened in fourth after three passes. The chances of making game when neither of us has an opening bid, is very slim. Therefore advancer's job is to bid to the correct level ASAP. Usually there is no reason to show partner how strong you are. Since partner might have doubled $1 \%$ with four spades and five hearts, it is very likely that the opponents
have an eight-card spade fit and the Law says that if the opponents have an eight-card spade fit and you have an eight-card heart fit you should not let them play at the two-level. Therefore the correct Law-Of-Total-Tricks bid is $3 \boldsymbol{v}$. Good things can happen if you bid $3 \boldsymbol{v}$. On normal days you push them to $3 \boldsymbol{A}$. On very good days you catch opener with a $4=3=3=3$ eleven count and he passes $3 \boldsymbol{\sim}$. RHO has $4=1=3=5$ and he bids $4 \%$. How do you like them apples? Two experts agree with me and bid to the three-level.

Adams: " 3 -Not sure why I need to bother showing my hand to a passed partner and to the opponents. I plan to get to $3 \downarrow$ over 2^ , so might as well just bid it and withhold information. Partner not bidding again in any case, given failure to open one or $2 \boldsymbol{V}$.

3* , a mixed raise showing four hearts and 7-9 points, gives opener a chance to double when he has long clubs.

Woolsey: "30-I assume this shows a mixed raise. I have the right strength for that. I'm missing a fourth heart, which is compensated for by my doubleton spade. In my world, partner doesn't overcall ll with four spades and five hearts - he makes a takeout double. So either we have nine hearts or the opponents have eight or more spades or both. Thus I will never sell to $2 \uparrow$ anyway, so I might as well get the preemptive effect in as well as showing my strength.'

The rest of the experts make reasonable bids only if partner were not a passed hand.

Abelow: "2*-With all three high cards working and a doubleton, seems best to show a limit raise of hearts."

Why? Do you really think that you might have a game?

Parker: " $2 *$-Why is 2 a strong raise and not $2 \boldsymbol{*}$ ? I bid $2 \boldsymbol{*}$, which should show a good raise for a passed hand. If he thinks it is a club suit, then it will be a good lead director."

Schwartz: " $2 \boldsymbol{\omega}$-In and out evaluation suggests this hand is worth a limit raise and partner won't play me for too much with my passed hand status. I am not making accepting any game tries."

If you're not accepting any game tries, why tell partner what you have?

Hopkins: "2*-It appears I have two quick tricks, only working cards including one of the top three trumps, and a likely ruffing value. This hand is worth a limit raise."

Roman: "2\%-Limit raise in hearts. I can't wait to find out what I'm missing here."

When an opponent opens in fourth chair and partner overcalls, a jump raise has no range. You could have as little as three points or as many as ten for a jump raise. All
it shows is four trumps. On this hand, wouldn't you be happy if partner played $3 \checkmark$ ? Cappelletti: " 2 -As in Cappelletti over one-of-a-major doubled bid $2 \leqslant$ with the constructive raise.'

Landen: " 2 -Why isn’t 2* defined? Partner, being a Law-abiding citizen, will bid to the three-level with six trumps. I have no
reason not to be the straight man on this hand." King: " 2 — I'll fall for it. Looks like 7-9 and a three-card raise to me. Aren't we allowed to have the top of our bids some times, especially with such awful spots?"

After an overcall of a fourth seat opener, advancer's only job is to bid to the correct Law level.

Committee Action ${ }^{\text {* } 60 ~}$

A case from the recently concluded 2008 Spring NABCs in Detroit makes a couple of important points about claiming on defense. The hand in question arose in the first qualifying session of the Rockwell Mixed Pairs. Here is what happened.

On tricks 8-10 declarer played three rounds of clubs, North coming down to two clubs and the $\bullet$ Q, West holding the $\uparrow$ QJ and $\bullet$, East the $\uparrow$ K9 and $\vee \mathrm{K}$, and Dummy the 85 and $\vee$ Q. At this point East said he would hold the \& K and West then said she would keep the

- A. North immediately called the Director.

After an initial incorrect table ruling the case underwent Directorial review. Laws 68A (Claim Defined) and 70 (Contested Claim) were ultimately (correctly) applied and it was determined that in light of the auction and play
up to the point of East's claim it would have been irrational for West to discard the A. Therefore, a result of $5 *$ dorth down one, -50 for N/S, was assigned. N/S appealed.

At the hearing South claimed he saw some or all of East's cards when East made his statement about keeping the $\boldsymbol{\wedge}$ K. Neither North nor West saw East's cards. N/S believed that East's statement gave unauthorized information to West which made it clear that she keep the A. In addition, South asked the Committee to consider a procedural penalty (PP) against E/W. South refused the Committee's request to estimate how likely he thought it was (without the UI from the claim) that West would pitch the

- A prior to trick 13 in order to keep the $\uparrow$ Q.

West said East's 3A bid marked him as having started with four spades and North had already shown up with the other two (having followed with a spade at trick 1 and having pitched a second one on the A at trick 6). Thus, she would never keep a spade to discard the A.

The Committee agreed with the Directors' ruling. They judged that East would keep the $\uparrow K$ in the one-card ending, both because he had seen North pitch on the $\boldsymbol{A}$ and ruff a heart and because he said he would keep it in his claim statement. West would then retain the A as her thirteenth card both because she knew from East's 3a bid and the play so far that North held no more spades and because the $\uparrow Q$ could not win trick 13 if the $\wedge \mathrm{K}$ was still unplayed. The Committee therefore allowed the Directors' assigned score of $5 *$ by North down one, -50 to N/S, to stand. They also considered a PP and determined that East's actions, though possibly unfortunate, were certainly understandable and made a PP unwarranted.

The Committee then considered whether the appeal had merit. The only conceivable reason they could find for not finding that the appeal lacked merit was the initial incorrect table ruling. Two of the members thought that was sufficient to give the appeal merit. The other three disagreed strongly; indicating that asking West to pitch the $\boldsymbol{A}$ was beyond the pale and that N/S justly deserved an

AWMW. Based on the two "no" votes the Committee did not award an AWMW.
The important points this case makes are:
(1) Claiming on defense is risky: Avoid claiming on defense if your partner could in any way be involved in the subsequent play-and even then think twice about it. In the present case, had West been judged at all capable of pitching the A (say she was a non-expert or inexperienced enough to possibly be unaware of all of the inferences available from the auction and play to that point) Law 70 D 2 would have been applied. Law 70D2 states: "The Director does not accept any part of a defender's claim that depends on his partner's selecting a particular play from among alternative normal* plays. (* For the purposes of Laws 70 and 71, "normal" includes play that would be careless or inferior for the class of player involved.)" In other words, an inexperienced or less-than-expert defender could—and should-be judged capable of missing a subtle inference from the bidding or previous plays or of not paying full attention to the cards being played on the run of the clubs.
(2) In cases where the defender in question is an experienced expert and it is clear from the bidding and play that saving the wrong card(s) cannot be correct-in the words of the laws, doing so would be just too "careless or inferior for the class of player involved"- the defender should not be forced to make a play that goes against the "obvious" authorized information present. In this case, the fact that East had freely bid spades at the three level (thus showing at least four of them), that North had already played two of them, and that the K would still not have been played at trick 13 clearly meant that saving spades and pitching the A was just too inferior a play for West to make. She should be allowed to save the A in spite of the fact that East's claim made doing so clear cut.

Astute readers will note that (2) above is based on the same principle that applies when unauthorized information is present during the auction: If a player Alerts, answers an opponent's question, or does anything to provide information that is unauthorized to partner, thereby indicating what action of partner's will likely work best next, if that action is clear cut anyhow based on partner's own cards or the previous auction, then partner must be allowed to take that action in spite of the UI. Only if there is a reasonable chance that the partner would have taken some other action without the UI should one indicated by it be disallowed.

Dedicated to my twin sister, who suggested I write about doubles. When we were kids, we were always causing "double trouble"

## Stay Out of Double Trouble!

Have you heard the one about the bridge player who wanted to have both X's and D's in her bidding box? When asked why, she replied, "How else will my partner know if I'm doubling for takeout or for penalty?"

There are many, many kinds of doubles, but the only ones you really need to know are the penalty double, the takeout double, and the takeout double's cousin, the negative double. Partner will never spring a Stripe Tail Ape double on you without discussing it first. (And no, I didn't make that up...but don't ask me what it is!) Unless you and partner have agreed to play some of the fancier doubles, the $\$ 64,000$ question when partner doubles is, "Is it takeout or penalty?"

## The Takeout Double

A double of the opponent's opening bid at the one level, and usually also at the two level, is a takeout double. (Doubles of opening threeor four-level bids may be either for takeout or penalty, by partnership agreement.) The takeout double says, "I have a hand worth opening and support for all the unbid suits. Please name any suit other than the one our opponent opened."

The takeout double promises a hand with no more than two cards in the opener's suit, at least three cards in all the unbid suits, and usually no five-card or longer major suit to overcall. If opener's suit is a minor, the double promises at least 4-3 in the majors. If the opponents have bid a major, the double shows exactly four cards in the other major suit.

Therefore,
1* - X shows at least three diamonds, and 4-3 or 4-4 in the majors.

1v - X shows at least three in each minor, and exactly four spades.

## The Negative Double

A negative double is similar to a takeout double in that it also promises four cards in at least one unbid major. The main difference is that a negative double is used by responder after the opponents have overcalled. Also, the negative double promises as little as 6 or 7 points at the one level, and it does not promise shortness in the opponent's suit.
$1 \boldsymbol{1}-1 \boldsymbol{-}$ X shows exactly four spades. With five spades, pard would bid 1A instead of doubling.

1* - 1 - X shows at least one four-card major. $1 \mathbf{v}-1 \boldsymbol{n}$ - X shows $4-4$ in the minors.

## The Penalty Double

The penalty double is just that: it doubles (and then some!) the penalty the declaring side will incur if they fail to make the contract. It also rewards them with big bonuses if they make their contract, so you should be reasonably sure you're going to set them before you make a penalty double, or leave pard's penalty double in. To make a penalty double, or convert pard's takeout double into a penalty double by passing, you need more than points: you need a trump stack. Four or five of their suit with a couple of honors is a trump stack. Four small cards in their suit is not.

How can you tell if it's takeout or penalty?

## Here are a few guidelines to help you decide.

## It's Probably a Penalty Double If:

1. We have a fit. Once we've bid and raised a suit, there's no need to look for another suit.
2. Partner could have done a takeout

## double of the same suit before.

$1 \boldsymbol{v}-\mathrm{P}-2 \boldsymbol{-}-\mathrm{P}$
4V - X is for penalty.
3. You've already described your hand. If you've bid two suits, or rebid your suit showing six or more, and partner doubles instead of supporting you, it's for penalty.
4. There are no unbid suits, or there's only one unbid suit (unless you have the advanced agreement that partner's bid of the fourth suit promises five cards).

## It's Probably a Takeout Double If:

1. It's a double of a low-level contract. At the one- or two-level, it's just too easy for the opponents to make their contract and rack up those big bonuses.
2. Partner might not have been able to do a takeout double before.

1* - $\mathrm{P}-1 \boldsymbol{1}-\mathrm{P}$
$2 \boldsymbol{- X}$ is for takeout. Pard couldn't double before because he doesn't have hearts.
3. Partner has shown two suits already. She

doesn't have enough cards left in her hand to have a trump stack.
4. Partner did a takeout double of the same suit earlier. Remember, the takeout double promises shortness in the opponent's suit. If he was short in their suit before, he doesn't have a trump stack now.

## Partner Doubled; Now What?

Bid if it's a takeout double; pass if it's a penalty double...except when you need to do the opposite! I'll talk about responding to partner's double in my next column.
