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PRESIDENT'S LETTER

NOT the friendliest game in town! I am disturbed by two recent conversations I have had, especially about the A/X level game on Thursday nights. One person told me that, having played in both the Northern Virginia unit game and our unit game, they found the game across the river to be friendlier and much more pleasant than ours. Another person told me that his wife decided to stop coming to our unit game because she felt it was not a friendly atmosphere to play in. Surely, if someone comes to visit you at your home, you would say hello and smile when they got there, not just ignore them. Similarly, if you went to visit someone you would greet them on your arrival. Well, NS are the "home" table and EW are the visitors, and they should follow the above minimum courtesies.

I have written before about the need to for some people to "lighten up" and reduce the intensity level a little. Lovenberg points are not so valuable as to be worth acting impolitely. Finally, if you feel your opponents are acting improperly, perhaps trying to intimidate you, for example, don't hesitate to call the director. Too often, recently, we have had behavioral issues at the table that the players have tried to solve themselves, only to have them escalate. Call the director first and nip these disputes in the bud.

On a more positive note, I hope you have noticed that the Sunday team game at our January sectional will be following a new format. It is a <u>bracketed team game</u>, where the field is grouped into brackets of 8, based on the average masterpoint holdings of the team members. Each bracket then plays a full round robin of seven matches, with the top three finishers receiving overall awards. The top bracket is open to any team that wants to enter, regardless of their masterpoints, as well as the teams having the highest masterpoint averages. (This bracket will

follow a swiss format unless it happens to have exactly eight teams.) Thus everyone can play against their peers, or can they can choose to play against "the big boys" if they prefer. This format has been tried in a number of places around the country and has been quite popular. One of our members, **Bob Stearns,** played in it a few months ago and liked it so much that he presented it to our board and suggested that the WBL try it out. We were happy to oblige, so come to the Sunday team game, see if you like it and give your feedback to any board members you see. Also, if you have any suggestions for improvements in how the WBL does things or new ideas you want to suggest, we are always happy to hear from our members.

You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that

answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

What is the minimum needed to balance when you have support for of all the unbid suits? The void in hearts would be a flaw if you were doubling 1♥ in passout seat, since it's often necessary to be able to lead trumps but with dummy having trump support, the void is less of a problem. If you use the 'when in doubt bid one more with a void' rule, the void gives you

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more reason to bid. I'm of the opinion that when in doubt bid. I would double with ★ Kxxx♥ - ◆ 10xxxx♣ AJ10x. The ten of clubs could easily be worth a trick. If partner has ♠ QJxxx♥ xxx♠ xx♠ Qxx, 4♠ is on a club finesse and some breaks. Give him ♠ xx♥ xxx♠ KQJxx♣ Qxx and 5♠ makes if both black honors are onsides. If one of the black honors is offside, they will make 4♥.

Five experts need at least ♠ KQxx♥ -♦ 10xxxx♣ AJ10x. One ace with two quick tricks so if partner passes, they have some defense.

Adams: "C—Partner passing is quite likely, so I should have some hope of beating this. Partner will pass any time he does not have four spades or a long minor. Hoping partner will bid a four-card diamond suit as a magic save is silliness. That said, I can't wait until I'm sure of setting them. With a void, come alive."

If partner has both minors he can bid 4NT giving you a choice.

Landen: "C—That hand is too strong offensively to risk not acting. The double is for takeout and partner is expected to bid 44 on most hands where he has four. It might be tough for them to double us even when they should. I'd much prefer my spades to be headed by the ace rather than the KQ, but matchpoints promotes aggressive bidding."

Cappelletti: "C—But would do B if partnership agreement is that double of 4♥ is for take out."

I can't think of any reason why the double wouldn't be for takeout.

Aronsohn: "C—KO."

Hopkins: "C—I would like to have two quick tricks for this call and some control over our most likely trump suit if we declare and things go bad."

Lublin: "C—I go with letter C which gives me at least two quick tricks."

Three experts need more than ♠ KQxx.

Woolsey: "D—On an auction where partner might well be passing a takeout double, it is vital to have aces when making a marginal takeout double."

Schwartz: "E—Partner didn't overcall not vulnerable so I am less concerned about a double game swing as a huge fit is less likely. I also prefer the stronger spade holding, as spades is the suit most strongly inferred by the double. If the auction were 4♥ - Pass − Pass, I would choose D (prefer the ten count with two aces) as a double game swing is more at risk and partner is unlimited being unable to double with a pure penalty double."

Parker: "E—I expect partner to pull this over 50% of time so I need offense to help out. If he passes I need defense to set it, so at a minimum the • A with the • Q."

There are two reasons to bid with one of the weaker hands. 1) When in doubt bid. 2) Bid one more with a void.

Partner has passed our opening bid. He has fewer than six HCP and that means the opponents have more than half the deck. Wouldn't partner pass 1♥ with ♠ J10xxx♥ x ♦ xx♣ Qxxxx or ♠ xxxx♥ xx♦ xx♣ xxxxx? You need a reason to bid. If West holds ♠ xx♥ AQJ9♠ AJ10x♣ xxx, he would be very happy to hear you bid a red suit at the two-level. You usually want to push the opponents to the three-level where it's easier to defeat them. However, if partner has support for one of your suits, he's less likely to have defense in their suits. I don't think there is a reason to be a hero on this hand. The auction is not over and maybe partner has something he wants to show for instance six clubs to the OJ.

Four experts agree with me and pass for now. **Landen:** "Pass—There's not much future offensively and it's not safe to bid. At matchpoints, I'd risk 2♦, but I don't see any point in it at IMPs."

Not sure what difference the form of scoring makes. If you go for a number, it's bad at any form of scoring.

Aronsohn: "Pass—I hate to pass in bidding quizzes, because that answer usually doesn't get many points. But that's surely what I'd do at the table."

Hopkins: "Pass—I can't see where we can outbid the opposition unless partner can find a call at his next turn. And there are downsides to bidding, particularly if we are in a misfit situation."

Schwartz: "Pass—We are outgunned in HCP and I have short honors so what's the point in bidding? Bidding will only help the opponents in the play. I also have no clear way to get us to the right red suit."

Four experts stick their nose out. They make points but I think the suits should be better or longer. Put the queen of spades or the ace of clubs in the red suits, or give you five diamonds and it would be clearer to bid.

Woolsey: "2♦ —We will need a diamond fit to compete with partner being a passed hand. Also, a diamond lead might be key if West gets to 3NT, which isn't so unlikely."

Competing works when you push them up to the three-level and beat them. With our lack of defense, I wouldn't be surprised if the opponents made at least ten tricks.

Adams: "2♦ —If you give the opponents two suits to worry about, they often misjudge. If you offer partner a second suit, he might come alive if you find a big fit. Showing the sixth heart just does not have much upside with a bad hand, and the bad suit could mean I am in trouble if I do not offer partner a choice. Double shows a better hand."

Cappelletti: "2♦ —Since I won't bid a third time all by myself."

Lublin: "2♦ ."

One expert puts all of his eggs in the heart basket.

Parker: "2♥ —I always rebid a six-card suit over a four-card suit. Pass, never!"

Its usually right to compete but when its more likely that you go for a number then set them, wait for the next hand.

We have five-card support, a reasonable six-card and two singletons. If opener has ♠ Axx♥ Kxxxx♦ Axxx♣ x, 6♥ is a reasonable contract. However, the opponents are out there and spades outrank hearts. The question is do we preempt or do we try to have a constructive auction. This hand has lots of playing strength but very little defense. Seven experts make heart-showing bids with at least limit raise strength. Four of the bids are forcing to game and create a force. The opponents can't play a contract undoubled. If the opponents keep bidding spades, partner will expect you to have more defense. I guess you would have to double 5 unless partner showed club values.

Two experts splinter in spades. If the opponents bid 4♠ and partner doubles, he won't be doubling on two small spades. On the other hand, the opponents don't always have a large spade fit. Partner is allowed to have ♠ xxxx♥ Kxxxx♠ Axx♣ A. Now the

splinter will insure that you get to 6♠. If he has ♠ Axxx♥ Kxxxx♠ Ax♣ Kx you might even get to seven. Splinters let you know that you don't have two quick losers in a suit and tell you that your KQ in that suit are wasted values.

Woolsey: "3♠ —I have huge playing strength. If partner drives to slam, I'll bet my hand won't be a disappointment. If they bid 4♠ and partner doubles, at least he knows what to expect from me in the trump department. If he doesn't double I'll bid on, and likely either 4♠ or 5♥ will make."

Adams: "3♠ —I can't show all my features, so show the one most likely to get partner thinking slam or thinking what to do over 4♠. If I had a fit jump option I might try it."

Splintering in diamonds will force you to pull partners double of 4. Usually when you splinter in one suit you have strength in the other three suits.

Hopkins: "4◆ —I'm going to splinter here and hope partner can infer Spade shortness in addition from the subsequent bidding. Also, partner might be able to lead the unsupported Diamond Ace against a Spade contract knowing he can give me a ruff."

Three experts bid 2 showing a limit raise or better in hearts. Not a very good description of your hand which means partner is not going to know which of his honors are good and which are bad.

Cappelletti: "2♠ —Too good for 4♥ and a good Blackwood hand if partner shows a sign of life."

Two experts wish they were playing fitshowing jumps. It would nice to be able to bid 3. showing at least five clubs, at least four hearts and at least limit raise strength, but that is not part of our system.

Landen: "2♠ —It would be nice to be playing fit showing jumps (I'd bid 4♣). I'm a little too strong offensively to bid 4♥ and that will almost surely fetch 4♠. I'll cue to show a good raise and later will bid 4♥ if allowed."

Lublin: "2♠ —I would like to make a fit jump in clubs but not allowed so I bid 2♠ and pull all doubles and spade bids."

One expert takes partner out of the pic-

ture but with this hand how could partner make an intelligent decision.

Parker: "4♥ —Bid what you think you can make and take up as much room as possible. I will bid 5♣ over 4♠."

Two experts violate the 'sent trumps ASAP' rule. The problem is that if the opponents bid 4 , partner is going to look at his clubs when deciding what to do. If he has a singleton club, he will double 4 and that's not what you want to happen. You want him to double 4 with spade strength.

Aronsohn: "2.4 —Let's get partner involved early, so he'll know what to do if and when the opponents outbid us in spades, so he can make an intelligent and more informed decision."

Schwartz: "2♣—Any strength showing bid commits us to the five-level over the expected opponents 4♠. At least when I follow with 5♥ partner can expect shortness in both pointed suits instead of me having to guess which short suit to splinter in. I have sympathy for 4♥ for at least now I can defend spade if partner freely doubles."

Splinters are great for constructive auctions.

We could have opened 1NT with our sixteen HCP and if we were 5-3-3-2 we would have but we are 5=2=2=4. The plan was to open 14 and over 1NT, bid 24 and

follow with 2NT. Now the problem is what to bid over partner's negative double. Give partner a normal negative double such as ♠ xx♥ xx♠ QJ10xx♣ AQxx and what strain and at what level do you want to play in? What you don't want to play in is notrump. If LHO has six hearts, he will very likely take five hearts and a diamond. Opposite the above hand, you want to play in 4♠ where you'll lose one heart, one diamond and probably one spade.

Three experts bid notrump. I don't like playing in notrump with one stopper when there is a long suit out there when there is any other option. Give West ♠ x♥ KQJxxxx♦ Axx♣ Ax and he'll make 2NT. I'd want partner to have something in hearts to play in notrump.

Parker: "2NT—May not show this good a hand but should lead to the best contract. If partner passes we should make it, it he raises we should make it and if he bids 3♠ or 3♣ that is good also."

Why would he bid 3 ? If he had spade support, he wouldn't have made a negative double.

Cappelletti: "2NT—Have to make a nonminimum bid since partner might have ten+ points."

If partner has more than ten HCP, he's allowed to bid again over a minimum bid.

Hopkins: "3NT—I believe this shows about 15-17 HCP and a balanced hand. Partner's perfect minimum looks like ♠ Jx♥ J9x♦ AJxx♣ Jxxx."

You're giving him both major suit jacks, which are golden. Change the jacks to the king of clubs and where are you?

Two experts cue bid. Cue bids are forcing to game so you'll have to bid again if partner responds 4♣. I don't think you want to be in 5♣ opposite ♠ xx♥ xxx♠ AQJx♣ Qxxx but it does have play.

Woolsey: "3♥ —This risks wrong-siding 3NT, but otherwise maximizes our chances of finding the best strain. Other approaches could lead to a very wrong contract."

Landen: "3♥ —I'll make a slight overbid to facilitate finding the correct strain. I don't believe the double promises both the unbid

suits; partner will strain to act with sufficient values to compete. Therefore, I can't over emphasize clubs at this stage."

Five experts were thinking about 3NT. 3NT will be good if partner has heart help. One expert fails to make 3NT an option.

Adams: "4♣ —Invitational. 3♥ would be game forcing. Not strong enough for that. 3♣ is more attractive at matchpoints."

Two experts bid their four-card minor at the minimum level

Aronsohn: "3. —What's the problem?"
Lublin: "3. —I bid 3. because partner tells me he has them."

One expert jumps in his six-card suit. AKQ9x plays well opposite Jx. Even plays reasonable opposite a singleton. If you had a sixth spade, the question would be 34 or 44.

Schwartz: "3. —I will likely need to develop club tricks so to force to 3NT without heart help seems misguided and 5. opposite a minimum is likely too high. Thus spades is probably the right strain 3. immediately shows the invitational nature of the hand."

You can sometimes treat AKQxx as a sixcard suit

Partner responded 1 to your takeout double and RHO rebid his hearts. How do you show at least 17 HCP with exactly two hearts? Double. The typical Six experts agree with me and double.

Woolsey: "Double—This typically shows 18-19 points with 3-2-4-4 shape. I'm close to that. If partner doesn't have five spades and doesn't have a clear minor-suit preference he will bid 2NT (not natural), and we will get to 3. And if partner happens to be able to pass the double, that will be great."

Woolsey makes a point. 2NT after a takeout double is best played as choice of suits asking the doubler to bid his longest minor. If you have a natural 2NT, you would pass the double. Works well when you are dealt **xxxx**xx**xx**xxxx. The doubler will bid 3** with equal or longer clubs. On the other hand, if you bid a minor you really have it.

Adams: "Double—Shows a good hand with three spades. Looks like what I have."

Landen: "Double—I must act again with 20 HCP and double seems better than 2NT or 3♣. If partner retreats to 2♠ I'll pass. My double typically shows three spades and a hand of about this strength."

Cappelletti: "Double—And await further input."

Hopkins: "Double—I play this as 18/19(+) HCP and three-card support with most partners."

Schwartz: "Double—Need to leave room for a 2. contract. Double works out poorly only when partner is 4-4 in the pointed suits so is worth the risk. 2NT is most likely to get us to a game, but is also most likely give us a minus score."

Double leaves room for a 2♠ contract.

Three experts try other routes but will get overboard if partner has nothing.

Aronsohn: "2NT—Least of all evils."

KQ doubleton works well, only if partner has Jxx.

Lublin: "3♥—I bid 3♥ to show this hand."

Parker: "3. —This hand has the points for 2NT but with only one heart stopper I will err on the side of bidding my longest suit. Partner can rebid Spades with five."

3♣ figures to be a reasonable strain if partner passes.

Takeout double followed by double is a two-card double with extra values.



COMMITTEE ACTION #58

An appeal from the second qualifying session of the Von Zedtwitz LM Pairs in Nashville this past summer illustrates the importance of correcting partner's mistaken explanation to the opponents at the earliest legal opportunity. (If you are the declaring side, the correction should be made at the end of the auction, before the opening lead is faced. If you are defending, the correction should be made immediately following the cessation of play but not before, since a correction during the play would provide partner with Unauthorized Information.) On the following deal South neglected to do his duty at the appropriate time and his side paid dearly for the oversight.

Before the opening lead East asked if the sequence showed spades. North said, "Yes, he should have spades" and South did not correct this explanation prior to the opening lead of the \$\.10\$. When dummy appeared East called the Director and told him (away from the table) that he would have led a spade if he had not been misinformed about spades. The Director instructed that play continue, after which N/S made eleven tricks for a score of +460. At the end of the play the Director was called back to the table. In accordance with Law 40C, the Director determined that North's failure to explain completely the meaning of South's 3♦ bid had damaged E/W. Therefore, in accordance with Law 12C2, the score was adjusted to the result that would have been obtained had East led a spade (as he told the Director he would have earlier): 3NT by North made three, +400 for N/S.

N/S appealed the ruling. At the hearing South said he made a checkback rebid to give North a choice of rebidding 3NT or 4♥. His 3♦ bid promised five hearts. N/S's convention cards did not reflect the fact that South's failure to show spades (by bidding 34 directly over 2NT) denied a 4-5 distribution and North's explanation made no mention of thatnor did South correct North's deficient explanation in time for East to use the correct information to determine his opening lead.

The Committee expressed concern that N/S's convention card did not indicate their full agreement as to how they played their checkback bids as came out at the hearing. They believed that North's erroneous explanation and South's failure to correct it appeared to be attempts to discourage a spade lead. The Committee judged that

South's 3♦ bid and his subsequent 3NT bid over 3♥ showed spades. The fact that East told the Director that he would have February 21-24, 2008 led a spade before it was known that a spade lead was right, substantiated his claim. The Committee therefore upheld

the table Direc-

tor's decision to adjust the result to 3NT by North made three, +400 for N/S.

The Director and Committee in this case were right on target to adjust the score for N/S's failure to provide accurate and timely correct information about the meaning of South's bids. The only bone I have to pick is with the Committee's failure to issue an Appeal Without Merit Warning to N/S for appealing the Director's very clearly warranted score adjustment. This appeal was a total waste of this Committee's time, which is the signature indicator that an appeal lacks merit.

When you have the chance to open the bidding, if you have at least 12-13 HCP, you have a bid, even if you don't have a five-card or longer major. You have 13 cards, don't you? If you have at most four hearts and four spades, then you've got at least five cards in the minors. *Don't pass...* open in a minor suit.

Don't worry that partner will think you want to play in your three-card club suit! When you open 1. you're not telling partner that you want to play in clubs, and you're not saying you have good clubs, or even that you have four clubs. Opening 1. just gets your foot in the door. Your bid says, "I have an opening hand, pard, and more to tell you later...what do you have?" It's just a way to start the conversation between you and partner that will determine where you'll play the contract, and how high you'll bid. In most standard systems, opening 1. says more about what you don't have than what you do have.

You don't have a notrump opener

You don't have a balanced hand that falls exactly into your 1NT or 2NT point range, whatever those ranges may be. Your count may be in between those ranges, in which case you'll open one of a suit and then jump to 2NT if partner bids a new suit at the one level. If you open 1NT with 15-17 and 2NT with 20-21, for example, opening one of a suit and jumping to 2NT on your next bid promises a balanced hand with 18-19 points. So your 14 opening denies a balanced 15-17 or 20-21, but you might be balanced with 12-14 or 18-19.

You don't have a five-card major

Opening 1. implies that you don't have a five-card or longer major suit. (Most duplicate players these days only open in a major when they have at least five of them.) You and partner can agree, as Steve and I do, to never open a minor when we have a five-card major. With five hearts or spades and a five-card or longer minor, we'll open the major and then bid and rebid the minor to show at least 5-6 distribution. It's also commonly acceptable to open 1. or 1. and then bid and rebid hearts or spades, showing at least six cards in the minor and five in the major...one of the few exceptions to the rule that you need six cards to rebid your suit when partner hasn't supported.

You don't have a 2♣ opener

Opening 1. says you didn't have enough points to open 2. thus limiting your hand to a max of 20 or 21 points. With fewer than 6 points, partner can pass your 1. opening. But don't worry about getting stuck playing in clubs on your 3-2 fit when pard doesn't have enough to respond! Very few contracts are passed out in 1. If the opponents do let you play and you get set, just remember that the more tricks they take, the more they could have made if they were declaring the contract. Maybe they missed their game!

Which minor should I open?

Most of the time you'll open your longer minor. You'd like to bid a suit with at least four cards in it, but when your only four-card suit is a major, you'll need to open a three-card minor. With 3-3 in the minors, open 1♣. This lets partner assume that when you open 1♣, you have at least four, so he can support you with four. But when you open 1♣, you may have only three, which means he needs five clubs to support you.

What happens when you have four spades, four hearts, three diamonds and two clubs? You need three cards in your minor to

bid it, so you'll open this hand 1♦ . Pard will think you have four diamonds, and it may happen that you'll play in your 4-3 fit, but it's not the end of the world. This exact distribution doesn't come up very often, so we don't worry about it. (Note to advanced students: if it really bothers you to open 1♦ with less than four, you can agree to open 1♣ with just two, but that requires an alert.)

You've opened 1. ; now what?

If partner has at least 6 points and the opponents don't overcall, she must bid. Supporting your clubs should *not* be pard's first choice. Instead, she should bid a major suit if she can. Who wants to keep talking about boring old clubs when there's a flashy

major suit to introduce instead? If partner doesn't have a major, she can raise clubs with at least five of them, but otherwise, she'll bid diamonds or notrump.

At the duplicate bridge players' singles bar, they don't say, "Do you come here often?" and they don't say, "What's your sign?" How do they start a conversation? "One club."
