PRESIDENT'S LETTER

by WBL President, Richard Ferrin

We bridge players are a competitive lot. Our success is dependent not only on our own skill, but also on getting the best game possible out of our partner. If we or our partner make a decision at the table and a bad result occurs, it is natural to want to figure out why the result was bad, so that we learn from the experience and hopefully get a better result the next time we face a similar decision. The trick, however, is to avoid the "deadly post-mortem."

We've all been there one time or another, dishing it out to pard or listening to pard dish it out against us. It is much more painful on the receiving side, with pard asking, "why did you bid X?" or "you should have known to bid Y." These discussions can be healthy, but only if the person on the receiving end is treated with respect and not as an all-purpose scapegoat. If pard tenses up at the end of every session just bracing him or herself for a torrent of finger-pointing by you, then not only do you turn what should be a treat for pard to get a chance to play with you into a dreadful experience, but you will never get the best game possible out of pard. The key is to make the

conversation a constructive learning experience, not the "deadly post-mortem." Here are a few tips:

First, and foremost, try to wait until after the session is over (if a pairs game) or before the next segment of the match (if a Swiss match or a knockout segment). The only exception might be that you may need to say something sooner if there is a real risk that you and pard have two different interpretations of a bid that may come up again the next hand. Waiting until the end of the session or segment to go over boards is hard to do, but it pays big dividends. Bob Hamman, one of the world's all-time best players, has an uncanny ability to set aside a bad result and immediately divert all of his energy to the next hand, instead of dwelling on the disaster that just happened. So much of this game is about concentration, and the post-mortem of the last hand at the bridge table inevitably draws energy away from the task ahead on the next hand.

Second, after the session or segment is over, if you think pard made a mistake, before you discuss the hand with pard, think carefully about what you could have done differently to avoid the disaster. If you think about it long enough, chances are that you can come up with something you might have done to make the right decision a little bit clearer to pard. If so, start the conversation with what you might have done differently to get a better result, rather than going immediately for pard's jugular. Even if you ultimately think that it was mainly pard's fault, start with your shortcoming first, it will make any advice you give to pard easier for him or her to swallow.

Third, do not make a habit of pointing out mistakes that were already apparent at the table to pard. Most of the time, when pard makes a mistake, he knows right away, and he doesn't need you to remind him. Bringing up those kinds of hands can seem like you are rubbing it in. You can be more constructive if you ignore those hands, and instead zero in on the hands where you think that

pard may still be unaware where he went wrong. (A little sympathy never hurts, either.)

Fourth, when you get around to pointing out pard's mistake, it is often helpful to ask, in a nice tone of voice, something like "did you consider bidding Y? How might I have made it easier to extract a bid of Y from you?" Don't turn your partner into a "center-hand opponent."

Last, but not least, if you have a disagreement with pard about a bidding question, don't keep banging away at your side of the argument until pard relents. And don't repeat the points you have already made. Often you will quickly arrive at an impasse in the discussion, and should move on, when you hear yourself or pard repeating the same points. If the issue is that important, just agree that you both will check with an expert you both respect, and get that person's advice. You can each ask an expert independently, or together. You may both get different answers from different experts—that is what makes "Master Solver's Club" interesting—but at least you have a chance of moving the ball instead of letting the argument drag one or both of you down.

BITS AND PIECES

2013 WBL UNIT KO

The deadline for entering the 2013 Washington Bridge League Unit KO is Jan. 17.

There will be three flights of play: Flight A, Flight B, plus a Flight C for players with 0-300 masterpoints. The masterpoint cutoff for Flight B will be determined by the coordinator after reviewing the entries and the masterpoints of the teams entered. A 0-100 flight may be instituted if entries warrant.

For Flight C, the seeding will be random draw. For Flights A and B, the GNT qualifier on February 2 will be used as a factor in seed-

ing; however, you don't have to play in the GNT qualifier in order to play in the Unit KOs. If you have six members of your KO team, they can play on six different GNT teams on January 17. They will have six different seed numbers.

The cost is only \$30/team for the whole event for Flight A and Flight B. For Flight C, the cost is only \$16/team for the whole event.

The winning team in each flight of the 2012 Unit KO will be awarded a cash award equal to their entry fee.

You can pick up a copy of the problems at the WBL Unit Game in Maryland, and can send answers or requests for problems to robinswr@erols.com. You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a ma-

jority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

You have seven-card support for partner's clubs. However, you have zero high-cards outside of clubs. A raise to 3. shows club support, usually five, and 8-11 points. Usually, you have something in one of the red suits. From the opponent's silence, partner probably has extra values. Opener

can have up to 17 HCPs and bid 2. If partner has a hand like ♠Axxxx ♥AK ♦xx ♣Axxx or AKxxx ♥Qx ◆Jx Axxx he'll bid 3NT and 3NT has no play unless partner can win the red suit lead. If partner doesn't have the ace of clubs, he'll need two stoppers in whichever red suit they lead. This means that if partner bids 3NT, it would be very risky passing it. So if partner bids 3NT, you're going to bid 4. There's another thing to consider. The opponents have at least one eightcard red suit fit and could have two. While opponents very rarely balance against 3., they could and you have zero defense against whichever red suit they end up in. Since you're probably going to bid 4. eventually, why not bid 4. immediately. The big winner would be if partner would have passed 3. and an opponent has short clubs and makes a takeout double.

Seven experts raise to 3. The big problem will come if partner bids 3NT.

Parker: "3♣—Wimpy but I don't want to get past 3NT and have no sign of a stopper anywhere. Where are the opponents? My guess is partner will bid again. Maybe 3 ♦ or 3♥ should show this hand, since it could not show a real suit. If partner had opened 1♥, I could bid 2♠ as an im-

possible bid that shows a good club hand."

Cappelletti: "3. —Tempting to bid 4. You certainly don't want to defend but 4. might go minus and is past 3NT."

Theurer: "3♣—The most likely game is 3NT, but it's too big a position for me to just bid it now, even with this monstrous club fit. To make 5♣ partner would usually need significant extras and would surely bid over 3♣.such as what the sequence 1♥ - 1NT - 2♣ - 2♠ would show. Yes, occasionally partner will pass with something like ♠Axxxx ♥xxx ◆Ax ♣Axx and we'll miss a game, but it's non-vulnerable so the loss won't be so bad. ner to be declarer in a notrump contract, but unfortunately that is not legally possible here. I expect us to belong in a club partial more often than not if partner can't act over 3♣."

Adams: "3 .—I would want an extra King to bid 4. and pass is out of the question."

Hopkins: "3.—It is hard not to raise with seven Clubs. And if partner bids 3NT, he might even make it if his hand has the equivalent of three Aces. And the opponents might be able to make something, even game, if partner has wasted and poorly placed Kings and Queens in the red suits."

Schwartz: "3♣—The opponents are unlikely

to get into the auction now vulnerable when I could have a stronger hand defensively, so see no reason to take a likely minus by bidding more."

Landen: "3.♣—I certainly won't pass with seven-card support to 100 honors. On the other hand, I don't want partner to think I have close to an opening bid. Even if I could bid 2.♦ which could be some form of Bart, I'd choose the follow up that shows a minimum with support."

Two experts join me and show long clubs. **Woolsey:** "4. —This must show a huge club fit with spade shortness. Partner will do whatever is right."

Munday: "4♣—3NT is a tempting target (more so at MPs) but we've wrong sided it

and I see no way to reach it intelligently if it is correct. It would be nice if I had an impossible raise available; sans that option I will show great clubs and not much else by jump raising what could be a three-card suit. Partner should be able to judge well from here. "

Sometimes one overbids to keep the opponents out of the auction.

Where do you think this hand belongs? Holding eight tricks, this hand could easily belong in 3NT. In slam, clubs would probably be the strongest trump suit. If you were in a spade slam you might have a trump loser if spades split badly. I think you ignore your spade sup-

port for a moment. Jump to 3. to show your great club suit with extra values. Over 3., partner can bid 3NT if he's strongly convinced that 3NT is the correct spot. If he really wants to play in spades, he can ask and then you can show your spade support. If he has a slamish hand, 3. is a good start. If he has a very weak hand, 3. would be a good partscore.

Two experts agree with me and show the best part of the hand.

Woolsey: "3.4—The auction isn't going to end here. I must show this huge club suit before the spade support."

Schwartz: "3. —Even with partner showing five spades notrump could be right if partner bids it. Bidding two-of-a-red-suit will only confuse the issue as partner will not be passing 3. ."

Seven experts force to game. Cue bids are forcing to game and ask partner to continue describing his hand.

Parker: "2 ♥—Let's start a force and see what partner bids next. I would like to bid 4♣ showing long clubs and spades but I need a fourth spade. If I had a major a jump to the five-level would ask for second round heart control by partner, but I don't think 5♣ asks for that, so let's start low and see what he bids next. The next round is harder."

Cappelletti: "2 ♥—And listen. This is the kind of hand you need more information from partner and opponents."

Theurer: "2♥—Not sure whether we belong in game or slam. Most likely we belong in clubs, but if partner is fairly weak we may want to opt for the ten-trick spade game. Imagine partner with ♠QJTxxx ♥xxx ♦ Kxx ♣x, for example. So I'll start with a cuebid to let partner give me more information.es are weak we can get to five or 6♣ or even 3NT if partner has hearts stopped and hopefully, NOT a club void."

Adams: "2 ♥—Not sure I want to play spades yet. Cue bid will let me bid more slowly. Cue bid denies four-card support, but do not think it should absolutely deny three-card support."

Landen: "2♥—Might be a slight overbid, but I have a lots of winners and I like that partner has shown five spades. I should have a better idea of partner's hand after his next bid. es. We might have slam. If so we most likely want to play in clubs."

Two experts show ten black cards with very good clubs. You do have the very good clubs but you only have three spades. 1 • —

1. — 4. shows four-card spade support and at least six good clubs with game-forcing values. This is the same auction.

Munday: "4♣—Lots of options but this seems the most descriptive and it was hard to resist bidding 4♣ twice in a row. My shape is not ideal but it conveys the essence of the hand; spade support, long strong clubs, and a hand that wishes to play at least game. If partner bids 4♥, I will make another move otherwise I am content to play 4♠. It might be right to play in clubs, which this gives us a chance to do also. I've not had discussions regarding a self-splinter facing a five-card suit, whether opener still promises four so I'll be interested in what the panel has to sav."

Hopkins: "4.4—I am going with a slight overbid. It has a lot of upside if partner has good Spades and either the Heart Ace or King. And it will make it very difficult for opponents to find their best contract if they have one. We are unlikely to get doubled given the distribution I have shown."

Eight-card solid minors are meant to play in notrump or slam.

Is K76542 a six-card suit? If it is then 2 ♦ is a clear rebid. I think this hand is similar to the problem of what to rebid holding ♠AQ♥K76542 ♦ 32 ♣ A43 when the auction goes 1 ♥ - 1NT. There are lots of experts who would rebid 2 ♣ after opening 1 ♥ and I think 2 ♣ is right here. If partner passes 2 ♣, it could be your best spot. If partner preferences 2 ♦ you can then bid 2 ♠ to show a good two-card spade raise.

Seven experts rebid $2 \diamondsuit$. Partner might pass $2 \diamondsuit$ with a singleton or a void in diamond and $2 \diamondsuit$ would be your worst possible contract.

Parker: "2♦—I do have a six-card suit, how can this be bad? If partner bids 2♠, I will raise, if he bids 2NT I will raise. What's the problem?"

He might think that ♠KJxxx ♥Axx ♠Qx ♣KQx would make 6♠ opposite three keycards. Cappelletti: "2♠—Certainly better than pass."

Munday: " $2 \blacklozenge -2 \spadesuit$ is a consideration but I'd rather have a small trump to ruff with potentially, and an honor elsewhere. 1NT has some merit given that RHO could not raise. $2 \clubsuit$ is an unnecessary distortion. The diamond suit isn't great, but there are six of them, so I opt for $2 \spadesuit$ as the least of evils. If partner can't bid again, we don't have game, though we may wish we were in a different strain."

Theurer: "2 ◆ —Yeah, my diamonds aren't very good, but I do have six of them, and no other rebid is particularly appealing or accurate. 2 ♠ on a doubleton is possible with the two good honors, but partner's spades could be weak and I don't really want to overly encourage him into thinking we have a real fit in that suit. If the bidding doesn't die here I can support spades later if I get the opportunity and we should be well placed."

Woolsey: "2 ◆ —I have six diamonds, and I have two spades. Even though the spades are better than the diamonds, length is most important. Misrepresenting trump length is a recipe for disaster."

Adams: " $2 \blacklozenge$ —Two-of-either-black-suit could be right, but it smacks of screwing around. $2 \blacklozenge$ is just normal."

Schwartz: "2 ◆ —At matchpoints it would be tempting to bid 2 ♠ but see no reason for this distortion at IMPS as a 5-2 fit with the high honors ruffing could be ugly. I will compete to 2 ♠ if the opponents bid 2 ♥."

Landen: "2 ◆ — What else? I'd like to have a better suit, but I won't raise spades with two, even if partner shows five."

One expert thinks that the AQ of spades are three and the K76542 are five. This makes a lot of sense to me.

Hopkins: "2♠—I normally would show my six Diamonds, but really think I have the equivalent of three cards in my partner's suit."

Sometimes it's right to bid a three-card club suit when other bids don't exactly reflect your hand.

You doubled and partner made a surprise bid, 1♥. In the back of your mind you might think, what do you bid in response to a takeout double of 1♦ if you hold ♠xxx ♥xxx ♦Jxxxx *xx? On bad days partner has that and you might not even make 4♥. On good days, partner has ♠xx ♥Jxxxx ♦xxx ♣xxx and 6♥ just needs a spade finesse through the opening bidder. So how do you continue? The way I bid is if I don't support partner's major right away, I don't have four-card or longer support. Therefore, Pass, redouble or 2♦ denies four-card heart support. 3 ♦ or 4 ♦ which are splinters show at least fourcard support. You could bid 4NT which is RKC for hearts. That obviously shows support. If you're not willing to explore you could bid 6♥.

I like 3♦ which is a splinter in support of hearts. 3♦ sets hearts as trump and usually shows short diamonds. Suppose over 3♦ partner bids 3♥. 3♦ could be a game try, so 3♥ rejects a game try. Over 3♥, you continue with 3♠ which is a heart slam try. Over 3♠, partner could bid four-of-a-minor, to show some slam interest. He could also bid 3NT to show a diamond stopper which doesn't improve your slam chances. Suppose over 3♠, partner bids 4♥ to show no slam interest. Now suppose you bid 5♠ asking partner to look again at his bad hand. Now he could bid 5♠, the Last Train, to show a little something or

could bid $5 \, \Psi$ to show complete nothing. If he bids $5 \, \Psi$, would you expect to have a good play for slam? I'd be worried about going plus. Over $5 \, \clubsuit$, if partner has any honors, he should bid a slam.

One expert splinters at the four-level. If you're going to splinter, why not splinter at a lower level?

Schwartz: "4♦—Followed by 4♠ over a 4♥ signoff. This should show length in addition to a control so partner might be able to bid a slam with the magical xx/Jxxx in the majors."

Five experts are bidding slam. With a partner that you can't trust either $6 \heartsuit$ or 4NT is probably the right way to go.

Parker: " $6 \checkmark$ —The spade finesse will be on, all partner needs is a doubleton spade and Jxx(x) of hearts. Very unlikely he has a black king."

Cappelletti: "6♥—Fast arrival might get you a better lead."

I can't believe that the lead would make a difference.

Munday: "6♥—Wow. I could see bidding this hand differently based on opponents, state of match etc. This might have no play but I want to prevent a minor bid on my left. and avoid directing a club lead by splintering etc. in diamonds. They may also have a great save at the seven-level. 6♥ has play opposite as little as ♠10xx ♥9xxx ♦xxxx ♣xx so it does not seem practical to stop short, partner is unlikely to cooperate with many hands that make slam laydown on the auction. On similar lines, we might have seven, change partner's spades above to JTx, but no way to find out that I can see. 4NT, if RKC is also a consideration to muddy the waters but I fear LHO will bid a minor at the five-level."

Hopkins: "6♥—Unfortunately, Exclusion won't allow me to find out about the black Kings safely so I bid what I think we can make. A hand such as ♠xx ♥Jxxxx ♠xxxx ♣xxx could be enough from partner. he pairs that can wheel out some asking bids will have an advantage here."

Woolsey: "4NT—The king of spades is a big favorite to be onside. North might have xxx in spades, but West's failure to raise diamonds puts several diamonds into North's hand increasing the chances that North has a doubleton spade. I'm driving to a small slam, and if North has the king of clubs I'll bid a grand slam. So RKC, then specific king ask, and I'll find out. If North has

bid a three-card heart suit, that's just too bad."

If this were a pinochle deck partner might have the king of clubs but East opened and then made a takeout double.

Two experts pass hoping to find out from the opponents what you can make. It's odds on for West to bid $2 \spadesuit$ back to you.

Theurer: "Pass—Not exactly the bid I expected partner to make!xtras, I need little for slam. The key is partner's spade holding, assuming he doesn't hold something in the minors that eliminates my club loser. k if needed. So here, for the moment, I can pass, and listen to what West says - maybe he'll bid 1♠ and then I'll pretty much know partner doesn't have three or more spades. If West bids a minor, I can cuebid at my next turn and see if partner does anything helpful."

Adams: "Pass—I'd like to find out if opponent's have a spade fit. Then I can bid a slam with no assistance. Probably opponents will bid diamonds, but who knows. Not overly worried about them finding a save. This also gives partner a chance to make a cheap free bid, which will also be enough. I don't think any amount of cue bidding will give me what I need."

One expert cuebids. Not sure what partner's

bid is going to tell you since he won't know that you have heart support. If I held ♠xxx ♥xxx ♠xxxxxx ♣x, you could be playing in 2 ♠.

Landen: "2 ◆ — My gut says 6 ♥, but I'll cue 2 ♦ for now. Any sign of life from partner and we're in six."

When you know what trumps are, tell partner ASAP.

The two possible meanings of a jump to 2♦ are weak-jump-shift, a similar hand to the one above or a fit-showing-jump. A fit-showing-jump shows at least five diamonds, at least four clubs and at least invitational to game values. Of the two meanings I prefer fit-showing-jumps. No matter how you play a jump to 2♦, a minimum hand that partner could have for this auction is ♠xxx ♥xxx ♠KQJxxx ♣x. He could have more and his values could be in spades. Remember, he didn't have to bid over the take-out double.

So what now? If you hold ♠xx ♥ KQJx ♦-♣KQJ10xxx or ♠x ♥ KQJx ♦- ♣QJ109xxxx. Do you really want to play in 2♦ when 3♣ figures to be a much better contract? Seven experts bid 3♣. 3♣ does not show extras. You might just think that 3♣ is more likely to make than 2♦. If 3♣ might not show extras, how does one show extra values here? 2♥!!!, 2♠ or 2NT. Playing Washington Standard, you can bid 2♥, since partner knows that you don't have five hearts since you didn't open 1♥. The only reason you bid 2♥ is that you have extra values. 2♠ shows extras but also shows spade values.

Two experts give up on game. However, their partner could hold $\triangle Qxx \lor Jx \lor AJxxxx \cr xx$ where $2 \lor is$ the worst possible contract here.

Parker: "Pass—Try for a plus score. Partner has six diamonds and probably no spade stopper. My guess is that the opponents will balance in spades."

Hopkins: "Pass—Maybe my high cards will be enough help for partner to have a shot at the contract. Bidding 3. probably would get us to a better suit, but increase the level."

Seven experts try to improve the part-score contract. They think that they belong in 2 ♦ no matter what they have in clubs.

Cappelletti: " $3 \clubsuit$ —Should be more likely to make than $2 \spadesuit$."

Munday: "3♣—Not enough quick winners to make 3NT a favorite if partner cannot move over 3♣ having not bid 1NT over 1♥. This gets my pattern across though it is a bit of an underbid. Still, I think game is less likely than getting a minus score by reaching with 2♠ or some other option."

With 2♥ available, partner's not supposed to bid over 3♣ unless he knows that he belongs in 3♦. He could have KQJ10xxx of diamonds.

Theurer: "3♣—Interesting that the opponents, who have at least eight spades between them, have not mentioned that suit. Possibly East has length there but was too weak to bid 1♠ over 1♠. My clubs are likely to be better than partner's diamonds else he might have done more than rebid 2♠ at his second turn. Is it worth the risk of going up another level of bidding to play in my better club suit? I think so - partner's diamonds could be six or more but rather weak. He doesn't know I have this club suit when I bid 1♥, I'd bid the same with 3424 pattern."

Woolsey: "3.4—If North is weak I fear we have too many spade losers to play decently in diamonds. If North has a fair hand and bids 3NT, my hand won't be a disappointment."

Adams: "3♣—Too strong to pass 2♦. This will probably make and if partner has anything, he can bid game."

Schwartz: "3.—Probably plays a trick better than diamonds and keeps slim game chances alive as partner did not make a weak-jump-shift."

Landen: "3♣—With a misfit and a minimum I'd pass 2♦ so 3♣ is forward going. I doubt his suit is as good as mine."

Playing five-card majors sometimes gives you an extra bid.



You never need to miss the unit game because your partner canceled at the last minute! The WBL has a guaranteed partner (GP) program for players who *occasionally* need a partner for the unit game. Here's how it works: we provide a standby partner; if an odd number of people in need of a partner arrive, we match the players as best we can, and the GP players with the one who is left. (If there is an even number of players looking, the GP goes home). You can always get a game.

Players in search of partners should try to arrive between 7:00 and 7:15 (or call ahead). The partnership desk closes at 7:25. You can call the WBL cell phone (301) 395-2760 at the last minute if are on your way and know you'll be at bit late.

Players are expected to try to find their own partners for most games. This program is primarily intended to encourage new players and players new to the area to come out and play, and to provide partners for folks whose partners have canceled. Experienced players normally will not be allowed to utilize the Thursday night standby more than once every quarter.

If you know you'll need a partner at least a day in advance, contact Barbara Doran (see below).

You might want to volunteer for the GP program yourself. It's a great way to meet people. If you play on the night you're the GP, you play free. If you volunteer, you receive a free play for any future unit game whether or not you play that night.

GOT CONCERNS OR COM-PLAINTS ABOUT WBL UNIT GAMES OR SECTIONALS?

As your WBL ombudsman, my job is to advocate on behalf of WBL members. Often, I investigate complaints from WBL members about our unit or sectional games. From time to time, I report to the WBL membership, WBL board or WBL staff, keeping members' names confidential. Even when an investigation is not warranted, the ombudsman may provide helpful advice to the WBL board or staff to improve conditions for the membership.

The ombudsman does not have the power to hire or fire unit game or tournament directors. However, the ombudsman is officially authorized to investigate problems pointed out by

members and may make recommendations to directors, their supervisors or the WBL board.

Here's what I've been hearing from the membership over the past few months:

- There is confusion and frustration about the WBL's slow play policy. I've looked at the policies (on the WBL website) and discussed this matter with the unit game chief director, the ACBL's field representative for our district, and the WBL board. The WBL board recently instructed unit game directors to not hold over slow play warnings from one unit game to a future unit game.
- Players in our games sometimes complain about the behavior or perceived attitude of directors who come to the table. Players especially object to directors who are not impartial-sounding, professional and calm in demeanor. The WBL board and the unit game directors are aware of this concern. Based on the feedback I've received from members, there seems to be a need for our directors to be a bit more customer-service oriented, with members being the customers.

There is also a feedback form available at the unit game or on the WBL website. Players may additionally lodge complaints with the director-in-charge of any WBL game or tournament and/or the WBL president and board.

MINOR SUIT AUCTIONS

"I don't think anyone in this tournament can bid diamonds to show diamonds. We lost the club suit in the 1950s. Now diamonds are gone and hearts are sinking fast."— Bridge Hall of Famer and 23 time National Champion Edgar Kaplan

When Edgar Kaplan famously noted the decline of the minor suits at the 1980 World Team Olympiad, he was commenting on the tendency of modern bridge to emphasize major suits and No Trump over the minor suits. And there is valid reason for that emphasis. The game bonus in No Trump requires taking only nine tricks, while a major requires ten. Minor suit games, where declarer must take eleven tricks to make his contract, require hands close to slam strength but score no better, and often worse, than game contracts that take fewer tricks.

Despite the bias toward major suits and No Trump, a large percentage of hands are opened in one of the minor suits. In the next

few months, we'll be examining how the auction develops after an opening bid of 1♣ or 1♠. First, let's discuss the opening bid.

When dealer opens 1 of a minor, everyone at the table should recognize two likely facts:
1) Opener does not have a five card major; and 2) Opener, if balanced, does not have either 15-17 HCP or 20-21 HCP, because otherwise he would have opener 1NT or 2NT. Another characteristic of minor suit openings is that when you open 1 ♠, for example, diamonds may not be your longest suit. That is usually not true with a major suit opening.

In most partnerships, players will open 1♦ when holding four clubs and four diamonds. But they will open 1♣ when holding three in each

minor even if the diamonds are significantly better than the clubs. This ensures that they will open 1 ♦ with only three diamonds only if they have specifically four spades, four hearts, three diamonds and two clubs (4432 shape), so partner can be confident raising with only four diamonds.

With these guidelines in mind, let's look at a few hands. What would you open holding:

AT7 KJ83 AJ4 964	Open 1 ♣. Even though the diamonds honors make for a much better suit, most partnerships do not open 1 ♦ with 3-3 in the minors.
A8 AJ3 JT75 K983	Open $1 \blacklozenge$. With four diamonds and four clubs, open $1 \blacklozenge$. This makes it easier for partner to raise diamonds if the opponents overcall. Also, if your shape is 4144 and you open $1 \blacklozenge$, then you can bid $2 \clubsuit$ at your second turn. If you had opened $1 \clubsuit$, then rebidding $2 \spadesuit$ would show <i>Reverse</i> strength (16+) and shape (five+ clubs and four+ diamonds), which your hand does not have.
KT63 J KJ4 AT953	Open 1.4. Although only 12 high card points (including the likely worthless singleton $\forall J$,) this is a good hand. If partner has support in either black suit, you expect to play in one of those suits.

Remember that a large percentage of the time that the bidding is opened in a minor suit, the hand is not played in that suit. After a minor opening, partner has room at the one level to respond that she has a four card major. When opener has the same major, the hand is likely to be played in some number of that major. With no fit, the hand is likely to be played in No Trump. So the first goal in the auction is to find a major suit fit, making it responder's responsibility to show or deny a four card or longer major at her first chance. Remember that, as a general rule, if responder does not bid a major after partner opens 1 of a minor, then there is a reasonable presumption that responder does not have a four card major.

For the next three hands, assume that partner opened 1.4 and right hand opponent passed. You hold:

♦ 8♥ Q984♦ A43♣ AQ863	$Bid\ 1$ \checkmark . You can support partner's clubs later if appropriate, but if partner has four hearts, and if the partnership only has the values for game rather than slam, you prefer to play in 4 \checkmark , the 10 trick game, rather than 5 \clubsuit , the 11 trick game.
▶ J73♥ J753◆ J93♣ JT2	Pass. Yes, partner may have only three clubs and partner may have four hearts. You may not end up in the best contract. But if you respond, partner will expect more and may bid too high. This collection of jacks is not worth a response even though you have a four card major. Do not look for a major suit fit when you hold a piece of junk.
★ KQ64▼ T654◆ K7♣ J95	$Bid\ 1$ \checkmark . Your spades are much better than your hearts, but bidding 1 \spadesuit would tend to deny four hearts. If partner has the first hand in the table above, you prefer to play in hearts rather than NT, since your club holding is so bad. In hearts, you have at most three club losers. In NT, there are at least four club losers.
