As WBL President, I hope the WBL is continuing to provide the fun and challenging game to which we have grown accustomed in the DC metropolitan area. We are indeed fortunate to host what is probably the largest weekly unit game in the country, and certainly one of the most competitive. Our sectionals also are well-attended and attract competitors at all skill levels.

But maintaining this level WANTED: of a unit game. and running four Sectional sectionals per Co-Chairs vear, does not

and cannot happen without the efforts of the membership. We have been fortunate in the past to have a few individuals devote countless hours to making our unit games and sectional tournaments run smoothly, particularly Kitty Gottfried who has been our Hospitality Chair, to Ron Zucker, our Sectional Tournament

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I certify that the above statements are correct and complete - Donna Rogall, Editor

Chair, to the late Nadine Wood, who did it all. However, Nadine is no longer with us, and Kitty is no longer able to serve as Hospitality Chair. Finally, as noted on page 5, Ron Zucker will be stepping down as Sectional Tournament Chair after the August 2014 sectional.

To be blunt, we are in a desperate situation. It is simply not enough to pay an entry

> fee and enjoy the game. The WBL Board has kept entry fees low throughout the vears, but only because we have

enjoyed help from our volunteers. We need you to volunteer. Not the next person, but **you.** If we get enough volunteers, the tasks can be spread evenly so that everyone can enjoy the game. For example, past issues of the President's Report have suggested that it might make sense to have two or more **Co-Chairs of Hospitality** for the sectionals. so that one person, for example, can oversee hospitality on Thursdays and Fridays, and another on the weekend, or perhaps one for the morning games and another for the afternoon or evening games. The same can be done with the *Tournament Chair*, turning the post into two *Co-Chairs*, as has been done on several occasions in the past.

The work still needs to be done or else our unit game and sectionals will grind to a halt, or perhaps dwindle to much smaller games like most of the ACBL units elsewhere in the country. None of us want to see that happen. But no WBL member must choose between playing bridge and volunteering; the key is to spread out the work. So again, I ask for your help. We need co-chairs for Hospitality (both for the unit game and sectionals), and cochairs for overseeing the Sectional Tournaments. Help us make it happen.

STRATIFICATION of events is based on average masterpoints of the team or pair. In any event or flight with an upper limit, no individual's total Masterpoint holding may exceed that upper limit.

DIRECTIONS: From Route 50/Arlington Boulevard heading west from DC and Arlington AND from Route 495/Beltway: Continue on/Take Route 50 West about one mile outside the Beltway, and turn left at Javier Road (the second stoplight after the intersection of 50 and 495). Take an immediate right onto the access road that runs parallel to Route 50. The Elks Lodge will be two buildings down on your left—parking on the side and in the rear. From Fairfax, heading East on Route 50: Pass the intersection of Route 50 and Prosperity Avenue—the Prosperity Medical Center will be on your right. Between the first and second lights after Prosperity, turn right into the access road that runs parallel to Route 50 and look for the Elks Lodge immediately to your right—parking on the far side of the building and in the rear.

TIME TO STEP UP?

from Ron Zucker

I have been the Tournament Chair since 2011. It's been a rewarding and fun experience. I've gotten to discuss hands with some of the

best players in the area. I've gotten to know some of the most interesting volunteers. And I've been lucky enough to see successful tournaments. However, I'm leaving the job after the August 2014 Sectional. Though it's been a wonderful opportunity, I am moving on.

As such, the Washington Bridge League is searching for a new Tournament Chair or Co-Chairs. <u>Four times a year, the tournament chair is required to:</u>

- * Coordinate with the Director in Charge regarding game choices and policies.
- * Arrange volunteers for provision of food and drink.
- * Report to the Board of Directors the results of the tournament.

- * Attend some, but not all, Washington Bridge League Board of Directors meetings.
- * Attend, to the extent possible, all four tournaments. Note that the Tournament Chair plays free at all WBL Sectionals.

There really is no previous experience, either in bridge or with the sectionals, required. I will walk you through everything. Assuming we can have someone lined up soon, I can run the sectional while showing all

that is done and by whom.

The ideal candidate is:

- * Able to receive a few phone calls and/or emails the week before the sectional, no more than 5-10 phone calls.
- * Able to attend four sectionals per year.
- * Able to store a very small amount of WBL items, including three coffee pots and a few other items. All of it will fit into a

If you send a self-addressed stamped envelope to the above address along with your answers, I will send you a copy of the new problems to ensure that you can meet his next deadline. You can pick up a copy of the problems at the WBL Unit Game in Maryland, and can send answers or requests for problems to robinswr@erols.com. You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL website. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a

majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

When partner makes a takeout double, you're supposed to bid a four-card major or longer major. What happens when you don't have a four-card or longer major? Even though it's unheard of to bid clubs, what other choice do vou have? You could bid 1NT but you don't have anything close to a stopper. You could bid a three-card major but you know by now how I feel about that. The books say that if you have eleven points and a four-card major you're supposed to jump in response to a takeout double. You need fewer points if you have a five-card major. If the hand were ★AJ95♥A62 ♦ 1063♣Q95, I would jump to 2 since partner promises at least three spades and 2 doesn't figure to be a stupid contract. However, jumping in a four-card minor is different. Partner guarantees at least three cards in any unbid major but there is no guarantee for unbid minors.

Three experts cue bid. Cue bids in response to a takeout double show two places to play. What are they going to do over partner's expected 2♥-bid? Unless you pass 2♥, partner will probably get you too high, assuming partner has a normal takeout double such as ★AKxx♥KJxx◆xx♣Qxx. He'll be looking for the other place to play.

Lublin: "2♦—I would bid 2♦ and bid 3♣ over a major response."

Parker: "2 ♦ —I am willing to play a 4-3 after all, partner will be declarer. I will pass any next bid unless he cue-bids, then 4 ♣."

If you're a passed hand, a cue bid doesn't promise a rebid. Usually the cue bid shows 4-4 in the majors.

Stone: "2♦—Descriptive bid; you have values but are uncertain of the contract. Partner will not go overboard since you are a passed hand. If partner then bids a major, you can bid 3♣. 3♣ is a reasonable alternative, but I think it implies longer clubs and necessarily fewer points. I reject the matchpoint 1NT, since it fails to convey your HCP or your lack of a diamond stopper. You could be left playing in 1NT, cold for 3NT, 5♣, or even 6♣."

Two experts join me and bid clubs. I don't like jumping in a four-card suit, especially clubs. So since I'm going to bid clubs on this hand I'd strongly prefer 2. I don't have a diamond stopper, so I'll bid my four-card club suit and hope that partner has support. If he

doesn't have club support, he's more likely to run from $2\clubsuit$ then $3\clubsuit$.

Hopkins: "2♣—Everything else is worse. I probably will get a plus score which should be worth something. My only real hope is that partner does an Equal-level-conversion to 2♥ so I can raise thankfully or that he raises to 3♣ with a big hand."

Woolsey: "3.—I have to show strength, and bidding 2NT with 10xx of diamonds could be silly."

If you think 1NT is silly, how silly would 3♣ be if partner has made a major-asking takeout double holding ♠AKxx♥KJxx♠Qxx♣xx?

Four experts bid 1NT. I don't like bidding 1NT without a stopper but 1NT might be the winning bid especially if partner is 4=4=3=2.

Schwartz: "1NT—Shows my values succinctly and with a lack of a diamond raise, partner is likely to have help. Jumping in clubs is the only other option and if partner doesn't have four that might not be pretty. I can't cue as a passed hand without a major."

King: "1NT—I have a balanced hand and 2NT seems a little too much, especially without a diamond stopper."

Adams: "1NT—Yes this is flawed. We are heavy on HCP, and light on stoppers, but it's likely our best spot even if they have five cashing diamonds. My partners could be 4333 pretty easily, but even with 4414, there is a reasonable chance 1NT wins just by staying low. We have to make 4.4 to beat 2NT."

Landen: "1NT—This may not be our highest scoring contract, but it's the most likely to lead to a plus score. My second choice is 3., but partner will expect at least five."

A jump to three-of-a-minor in response to a takeout double shows at least a five-card suit.

This is the case of the dog that didn't bark. If you pass, what will your partner think you have? If you had four diamonds and a good hand, you would double. You might not double with four little diamonds and a minimum. You can't have a four-card major, therefore the only four-card suit you figure to have is clubs. You are very likely 3=3=3=4. If partner has a doubleton diamond and at least four clubs, he'll know the opponents are probably in an eight-card diamond fit or at least a very good seven-card fit and he should bid something. If he's 4=4=2=3 with two little diamonds, he should bid a four-card major expecting that the 4-3 major-suit fit would be a good save against $2 \spadesuit$. Therefore pass is a very descriptive bid. If partner has three diamonds, he'll pass and the opponents will be playing in a seven-card fit.

Two experts bid their partner's hand. One bids 3. if one is playing with an inexperienced partner who doesn't know about the Law.

Lublin: "3.—I would bid 3. now because we rate to have eight clubs between us."

Parker: "3♣—I would have bid an inverted 2♣ last time, so now I need to show some fit and strength."

Five experts join me and pass. Be conservative with length in the opponent's suit and be aggressive with shortness.

Hopkins: "Pass—I would rather defend with this balanced collection. Partner can act if he so chooses, presumably with a Club suit."

Schwartz: "Pass—Double shows good defense and I have the expected length in clubs

so partner can possibly compete if short."

Woolsey: "Pass—I have described my hand. Partner will think it likely that I have four clubs, since I didn't respond one-of-amajor and I didn't double 2 ♠."

Stone: "Pass—It seems so tempting to bid 3 with 10 HCP and four clubs, and so cowardly not to. But you have a defensive hand with a reasonable chance of defeating your opponents' contract, even at the two-level. Further, 3 is likely to go down unless partner has five clubs. And what if partner has three clubs?"

Adams: "Pass—I really doubt I am getting rich doubling this. 2♥ tempting, but that will be silly if partner has three diamonds. Partner's balancing double should show a doubleton diamond, and his balancing two-of-a-major should show a singleton diamond, so we should be able to compete whenever partner is short, and defend whenever partner is long. My double is penalty since I could well have diamonds, and since I suspect they are in a seven-card fit, I just go quietly."

When the opponents are in a seven-card fit, defend.

Two experts double. The opponents could be in a nine-card fit and the last thing you want to do is double the opponents at the two-level in a nine-card fit. Why can't opener be 4=4=1=4?

Landen: "Double—Extra values and good defense. I must act at matchpoints."

King: "Double—Let partner know that I have a maximum with a lot of defensive values."

Be conservative with length in the opponent's suit and be aggressive with shortness.

You opened 1♣ expecting partner to bid one-of-a-major. However, partner surprised you by responding 1♠. The opponents hold at least eight hearts and at least eight spades and are silent, which means that partner very likely has a good hand. A raise to 2♠ would probably not end the auction. There are many paths that you can follow. I like 4♣ or 4♠. Both show at least six clubs and diamond support. There is no hand that's worth a four-of-a-minor bid that doesn't include at least six clubs.

Two experts bid 3♥, a splinter, showing diamond support and a singleton or void in hearts. If partner has a hand such as ♠xxx♥AKQ♠Kxxxx♣xx, he'll bid 3NT expecting that you have spades stopped and knowing that his heart honors are not working. However, splintering in hearts will not show a singleton spade.

Lublin: "3 ♥—I would bid 3 ♥ splinter and pull 3NT to 4 ♦."

Parker: "3 ♥—Splinter. This allows partner to cue-bid spades. Over 3NT by him I will bid 4♠, now he will know what cards are working."

If Responder bids 3. he's showing you spade values not necessarily the spade ace. He's not expecting you to have a singleton spade. You could also bid 3NT if your singleton heart is an honor.

One expert takes the direct path and bids

keycard. You need three keycards assuming the king of clubs is a keycard. However, partner won't count the king of clubs as a keycard so you'll be in slam opposite two keys no matter what he has in clubs.

Hopkins: "4NT—Or whatever Key Card system we use. Opposite two Key Cards, I might have to take my chances on the Club finesse if partner doesn't have it."

Six experts raise diamonds directly. They have two singletons and they don't want to pick one. The problem is that partner's first thought would be to try to get to 3NT. Therefore his three-of-a-major bid will show a stopper and not necessarily the ace.

Schwartz: "3 ◆ —I"know" partner has a good hand, so splintering with a twelve-count is courting trouble. Also there is the problem of what suit to splinter with. If partner bids 3NT, I am removing."

King: "3 ♦ —Although could also see bidding 5 ♦ directly but we have gotten this far without the opponents bidding a major, so I don't think they will come in now."

Stone: "3 ♦ —Shows your values and distribution while leaving space to exchange more information. No need to jack up the bidding higher to preempt the opponents, since they didn't compete at the one-level. Your opponents' silence suggests that partner has some values in the majors."

Adams: "3 ♦ — Do not like any alternatives. Do not like splinter since other major will be wide open. Do not want to force. My 1 ♦ -response promises diamonds, and is never some 3=3=3=4 waiting-bid."

Landen: "3 ♦ —I'm missing four primary cover cards. With two of them partner will drive to game, at least. I will pass 3NT if that's partner's next bid."

One expert jumps to 4♦. At least his partner won't be thinking about 3NT. 4♦ must show a strange hand which is what you have. If he bids 5♦, you'll know that you're off at least two major-suit aces. If he bids a major, it will be the ace and not just values in that suit. If you're going to jump to the four-level, why not bid 4♣? 4♣ allows partner to bid 4♦ so you can bid keycard.

Woolsey: "4 ◆ —I must have some distribution for this unusual call. Maybe partner can work out that the reason I didn't splinter in my singleton is because I have two singletons."

Four-level jump in your own suit shows four-card support for partner as well as a sixcard suit with at least two of the top three honors.

There are three popular answers and all three have flaws. You could rebid 1NT but that shows fewer than 15 HCP. You have 15 HCP plus a five-card suit. You could reverse into hearts but reverses are usually stronger. If 15 HCP, partner would expect you to have at least ♠x♥AK109♠K10987♣KQ10. The third option is to put a heart in with your clubs and rebid 2♣.

Six experts don't think this hand is worth a reverse.

Two experts rebid 1NT. 1NT has two strikes against it. Strike one is that the hand is too strong for a 1NT rebid. Strike two is that you have a singleton spade.

Lublin: "1NT—Although it looks like 2♣ is the right bid, I will rebid 1NT."

Parker: "1NT—Not good enough for 2♥ and no need to bid 2♣, since if partner has a good hand he can bid new minor and we will get to the right fit. If he has a bad hand then we can take the low road."

Partner might take the low road with 10 HCP. Also he might rebid a weak five-card spade suit. What would you rebid over 1NT holding $\triangle Q6543 \lor xx \lor x AJxxx$?

Four experts rebid $2 \clubsuit$. They don't say what they'll do if their partner bids $2 \spadesuit$. If they continue with $2 \heartsuit$, they should have reversed. I know what they'll say if their partner passes $2 \clubsuit$."Thank you for the great dummy".

Hopkins: "2.—Didn't we have a very similar problem recently? This gives partner as much room as possible."

Schwartz: "2. —Hand is far from a reverse, and too good for 1NT in addition to shape problems. 2. encompasses about 11-18 HCP so well within range."

King: "2♣—The club suit seems closer to a four-card suit than the diamonds are a rebiddable one and I have too many points to rebid 1NT even if partner knows I can do that with a singleton."

Landen: "2♣—Standard expert bid. Not strong enough to reverse."

If you plan on bidding $2 \heartsuit$ over partner's $2 \diamondsuit$ preference, you might as well reverse.

Three experts join me and reverse. If partner is weak, 2Ψ wins when partner is 5-4 in the majors and especially when partner is exactly 5=4=1=3.

Woolsey: "2♥—I'd rather overbid than misdescribe my shape."

Stone: "2 V—A perfect, if minimum, reverse. A pure 15 HCP in aces, kings, and an attached queen, plus a singleton so long as, as is the case with Washington Standard, you can get out at 2NT or at the three-level. 2 ♣ is the only reasonable alternative. The problem with that bid is when partner has a hand like ♣ 109xxx ♥ Qxxx ♠ J ♣ Axx, you'll rest in 2 ♣, cold for 4 ♥."

After reverses you can't get out in 2NT. However, you can get out in 3 ♦ if partner has a weak hand with diamond support.

Adams: "2♥—Overbid at IMPs, but gets the hand pattern right. An advertisement for Reverse Flannery responses. Playing that, I would not have to worry about a heart fit and could try 2♣ here instead, but that is not Washington Standard, so can't use that trick here."

Reverse Flannery responses: After a minor-suit opener, responder bids $2 \, \spadesuit \,$ showing five spades and four or five hearts with an invitational to game hand. Responder bids $2 \, \blacktriangledown \,$ showing five spades and four or five hearts with a non-invitational hand. $2 \, \blacktriangledown \,$ shows five to eight HCP. Using Reverse Flannery responses, you don't have to worry about partner having a weak hand with hearts when he responds $1 \, \spadesuit \,$.

When in doubt show your distribution.

In standard a two-over-one in a major in competition shows at least ten HCP and a five-card or longer suit. It's not forcing to game. If you had ♠Kx♥A19853♦1093 ♣K65, it would make sense to bid 2♥ over the opponent's 1♠-overcall. The target is 4♥ and you don't mind getting there light on points if you have some distribution. In this problem we have a five-card minor. One of the targets is 3NT where distribution won't help. The other target is 5♦ and we need a lot more strength then playing in four-of-a-

major. We have ten HCP and five diamonds but is this hand worth a 2 ♦ -call? I think that unless you have at least 11 HCP, you could easily get to the wrong contract. Either, you get too high when momentum gets you to a bad game or you don't get high enough when you pass partner's forcing bid. The problem with bidding 2♦ is what are you going to do next? When partner opens 14, he usually has a weak notrump which means that he will very likely rebid 2NT. If 2NT is nonforcing, is Opener supposed to jump to 3NT when he has a balanced 14 count? What does partner do with a balanced 18? He has to jump to 3NT and he won't know if he's missing a slam.

If you rule out 2♠, then there are three other choices, none of which makes me happy. Actually there is no bid that makes me happy. A 2♣-raise is missing a club. 1NT is missing a heart stopper. Passing could end the auction. Of the three choices, and taking a hint from problem one, you could bid 1NT? 1NT shows your strength and your balanced hand. The only problem is that you're missing a heart stopper. Even if the opponents run five hearts, you could easily take the rest. There are some experts who don't mind bidding 1NT here without a heart stopper. I good days, East overcalled in a four-card suit and they can take only four heart tricks.

Two experts raise clubs. 2. could be a silly contract if partner has only three clubs.

Parker: "2♣—No negative double with only two spades, no notrump without stopper, not good enough for 2♦ since I am stuck if he bids 3♣. Hopefully if goes 2♥ back to me and I can bid 2NT which shows diamonds too."

Stone: "2♣—By elimination. You can't double with only two spades. This hand is easy for those who play that a negative double here denies as many as four spades, with a 1♠ bid guaranteeing four or more spades, not five. But you are not playing those methods. Bidding 1NT is wrong because you have no heart stopper, and when notrump is right, you will have wrong-sided the contract. The problem with bidding 2♠ is that you have no ef-

Seven experts bid 2 ♦ which is an overbid. 2 ♦ will usually fetch 2NT and you'll be playing in 2NT no matter what Opener has.

Lublin: "2♦—I would bid 2♦ which is a slight overbid."

Hopkins: " $2 \spadesuit$ —It helps if you have rules on what further bids can be passed. I normally play 2NT, $3 \spadesuit$, and $3 \clubsuit$ can be passed but others are at least one-round forces."

There is something to be said that you could pass 2NT, 3♣ or 3♦. However, if partner has a good hand, having three non-forcing rebids will limit his options. Suppose Opener has ♠Ax♥AQx♦xxx♣AQJxx. He would like to bid a forcing 2NT to see if you have a slammish hand.

Schwartz: "2 ←—Suit a little lacking but have the values. I'm going to pass 2NT or three-of-a-minor."

Woolsey: "2 ◆ —Awkward, but the hand is just too strong to pass and 2 ♣ or 1NT could lead to a silly contract."

2NT could easily be a bad contract. What is opener going to bid over 2♦ holding ♠QJx♥Axx♦Kx♣QJxxx?

King: "2 ♦ — This is only a one-round force. I hate to pass with so many points, can't make a negative double without four spades, bid 1NT without a heart stopper when I know RHO has five of them or raise clubs with only three. So 2 ♦ is all that is left."

Adams: "2 ♦—I already bid notrump without a stopper once today".

If you did it once, why not do it again?

Landen: "2 ♦ —A bit uncomfortable, but no bid ideal. After two-over-one in competition, 2NT or, simple raise or preference to either of our suits is not forcing. To force you need to cuebid or bid a new suit".

I think that 2♦ is an overbid and 2♣ could lead to a 3-3 fit. 1NT is the least of all evils. If partner has a weak notrump, how bad can 1NT be? 1NT from your side could be better that two or three notrump from partner's side. At least he'll know your point count.

On rare circumstances, you're allowed to bid 1NT without a stopper in Opponent's suit.



PARKING ON THURSDAY NIGHTS

- Be aware that our host site on Thursday nights, Ohr Kodesh Congregation, has a limited amount of parking spaces on its main lot but there is plentiful street parking to accommodate the typical number of attendees.
- Please note that Bridge League attendees may NOT park in spaces on the small "back parking lot" at the rear of the facility. The synagogue maintains a daily evening prayer service that begins at 8 PM and the spaces on this lot are reserved for its attendees.
- All attendees must avoid using the parking spaces that are marked reserved for the clergy, even when seemingly not in use; clergy often return to the facility for evening activities.
- All attendees should use handicapped parking spaces only when appropriate.
- All attendees should be respectful of the neighbors and avoid parking in front of driveways.
- All attendees are expected to observe parking restrictions related to street parking. "No Parking" signs are posted in certain areas and standard laws should be followed. In particular: maintain distances from curbs (within one foot), intersections with yellow curb or signage (35 feet), stop signs (30 feet), driveways (5 feet), other parked cars (two feet), fire hydrants (15 feet) and park in the same direction as the flow of traffic. Police do periodically patrol the area and parking tickets may be issued to violators.

2014 WBL UNIT KO

The deadline for entering the 2014 Washington Bridge League Unit KO is Jan. 15.

There will be three flights of play: Flight A, Flight B, plus a Flight C for players with 0-300 masterpoints. The masterpoint cutoff for Flight B will be determined by the coordinator after reviewing the entries and the masterpoints of the teams entered. A 0-100 flight may be instituted if entries warrant.

For Flight C, the seeding will be random draw. For Flights A and B, the GNT qualifier on January 16 will be used as a factor in seeding: however, you don't have to play in the GNT qualifier in order to play in the Unit KOs. If you have six members of your KO team, they can play on six different GNT teams on January 16. They will have six different seed numbers.

The cost is only \$30/team for the whole event for Flight A and Flight B. For Flight C, the cost is only \$16/team for the whole event.

The winning team in each flight of the 2012 Unit KO will be awarded a cash award equal to their entry fee.

ture survival and strength.

To encourage Owners and Directors who support this Program, the WBL Board voted unanimously to subsidize student players who are enrolled in a Bridge in Schools program and who want to play in a participating club game. Students will present a voucher to the Director and pay only \$1. The club waives half the normal fee and will be reimbursed for the remainder — usually \$3 (for an \$8 game), upon request to the WBL Treasurer.

The Bridge in Schools program shows students how much fun playing bridge is; helps them see a way they can reinforce and expand intellectual, social and emotional concepts and skills already learned; and presents new math skills, social skills and life skills to them while they are having fun. Students and teacher-volunteers will profit both intellectually and emotionally from these intergenerational experiences. Our business communities report they are hiring candidates who not only have the required intellectual stills, but who appear to be able to interact successfully with coworkers from cultures different from their own and know how to lead teams of diverse co-workers. Business leaders report that their primary interests are in social and life skills; surveys indicate business leaders feel they can teach technical skills in "on the job training", but they gain superior employees if they give preference to candidates who appear to have the necessary social and emotional skills, as it takes too long to teach these skills to candidates who lack them but are otherwise qualified technically.

Bridge in Schools isn't the only way social and life skills can be acquired, but it is a wonderful way to acquire those skills, while making new friends and having a lot of fun. Administration or faculty members from several schools have expressed interest in starting the program in their particular school, but volunteer teachers are needed. WOULD YOU HAVE BID DIFFERENTLY?

Over the past six months, we have been analyzing a variety of auctions where partner opened one of a minor. To wrap up this series of articles, we felt it would be beneficial to demonstrate, with some hands that actually came up at the table, what can happen when you and your partner have not had time to discuss fully your style and agreements. Remember that while Two-over-One, Strong NoTrump and Standard Carding are a good start, it takes a fair amount of time discussing the details to avoid disaster at the table.

Hand one: Have you discussed this with your partner?

After a last minute decision to attend a local sectional, Ron was fortunate to pick up a fine player at the partnership desk. They barely had time to fill out a convention card, and no time to discuss any of the more difficult auctions.

On the third hand of the session, Ron was the dealer holding ♠8 ♥KT3 ♦KQJ8 AJ932. We have discussed this hand type in previous columns, and know there are two schools of thought: either open 1♦ and rebid 2♣ if partner bids 1♠ possibly misleading partner about your diamond length) or open 1♣ and rebid 1NT with a stiff spade (possibly misleading partner about your spade length.) Since Ron and his partner had not discussed their styles, Ron felt that it was safer to open 1♦. When his partner responded 1♠, Ron thought he had avoided a bad auction. He rebid $2\clubsuit$, and passed partner's $2\spadesuit$ preference.

Ron was glum when this dummy appeared: ♠KJ742 ♥J852 ♦73 ♣Q7. They had managed to find their six card fit on the two level. One opponent held most of the missing diamonds and, needless to say, Ron and his partner scored poorly.

So, what went wrong? First, neither of them did anything wrong, per se. Their auction

would be duplicated by many players. But they hadn't had time to discuss how they wanted to handle such minor suit oriented hands so neither partner was sure of what the other held.

Hand two: "I was just kidding, partner."

Playing with an excellent local player for the first time, Ron picked up a lousy hand white against red in 3rd seat. He held **♦**J8432 ♥K754 **♦**8 **♣**T93. Partner dealt and opened 1♦, and Ron had a difficult bid. On the one hand, a 1 h bid promised values he simply didn't have. On the other hand, Ron's partner may have opened 1♦ on a 3 card suit. Perhaps she was 4-4 in the major suits and relatively short in diamonds. At unfavorable vulnerability, the opponents might not bid and might leave them in a 3-1 fit.

Ron chose to respond 1. He thought that if partner bid either $2 \spadesuit$ or $2 \clubsuit$, then he could pass. He also knew that he could rebid 2♠ over opener's 1NT, since, with this partner, he had discussed 1NT rebids and he knew that a 1NT rebid by opener would always show at least two spades.

Instead, Ron's partner did something unexpected. She reversed with 2♥ and Ron knew that 2♥ was clearly 100% forcing. But Ron had already stretched the truth with his first bid and he thought that 2♥ rated to be a playable spot. Maybe, just this once, he could get away with breaking partnership discipline. With real discomfort, but attempting to look strong and confident, Ron passed.

Ron's partner, to her credit, remained calm, said nothing except "thank you" and played the hand. She held ♠AT ♥AQJ8 ♦ AKOT52 ♣8. When hearts broke 3-2, she had little trouble making eleven tricks. Plus 200 was not a good score, with most of the field in $4 \, \mathbf{v}$ for 650.

So, what went wrong? Holding 5-4 in the majors, many players would bid 1 iust as Ron did. He did have only four HCP, but with

a singleton diamond, he had six support points for either major. The issue here is partnership trust. If you tell partner your hand is worth a response, and then pass her forcing bid, she won't know whether to believe you in the future. Similarly, if you have made a game forcing bid, it's quite important that, even if you hate your earlier bidding, you don't stop short of game. You can't have a precise bidding conversation when someone runs off in the middle of it!

And what would have happened had Ron passed initially, as he considered doing? His LHO would probably have made a balancing double to reopen the bidding. The opponents had a nine card club fit, after all. And the double may have given Ron's side a chance to find their cold game in hearts. Ron realized that bidding and then passing a forcing bid was the worst of both worlds.

The moral of the stories...

None of us makes the best bid every time. Some hands are more difficult to handle than others. What Ron wants to emphasize is that regardless of what happens at the table, it is never helpful to vell or to criticize your partner. Accept the bad board with class and resolve to discuss it away from the table.

Also, remember that the next time, you may be the one who picks up a trouble hand. Try to learn both from your mistakes and the mistakes of others. And whenever you have a difficult auction, put that auction on your list to discuss with new partners. Ron now asks, even in the most casual partnership, if he is allowed to rebid 1NT with a singleton in partner's suit!

We look forward to seeing you at the table!

Editor's Note:

Did you know both of our columnists have also been volunteering as tournament chairs? -Ron for the open sectionals, Shawn for regionals and the NLM sectionals. But now, they each need to step back a bit.
