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#### PRESIDENT'S LETTER

For those of you who have never attended an NABC (commonly known as a "Nationals"), I urge you to do so. They are a lot of fun and it is interesting to spend time surrounded by bridge players, including some of the most famous in the world, immersed in the game we love. It also is a chance to see a number of different cities throughout the U.S. In the coming fifteen months alone they will be held in San Francisco, Detroit, Las Vegas, and Boston. Great diversity both geographically and culturally.

The most recent Nationals was held in Nashville in July and I wanted to tell those of you who don't know already, that the WBL did quite well there and it was not just "the usual suspects". It started with the Grand National Teams where the WBL represented district 6. Our team of Robbie Hopkins, Joan Lewis, Barry Falgout, Rusty Krauss (borrowed from NVBA), Steve Robinson and Peter Boyd made it to the semifinals before losing to the eventual champions.

The tournament also finished with some WBL players doing quite well. Angeliki Magklara became a life master less than a year ago and Jason Rosenfeld, who has moved to Boston, but is still a WBLer at heart and their teammates came in second in the two day National Swiss. This very tough field started with 130 teams, and for players of their youth and relative inexperience to finish so high is quite an accomplishment and an inspiration.

But the main story of the whole tournament was of a four person team who started out as the 67th seed in a field of 74 for the Spingold Teams and won match after match against higher seeded teams all the way into the semifinals. For such a low seeded team to go this far would be like Princeton or Morgan State getting all the way to the NCAA basketball finals. This Cinderella team was captained by the WBL's own Hailong Ao and included Jian-Jian Wang, also of the WBL and David Chechelashvili who moved from the WBL to California a few

To all of these players, I say, "Well done indeed!" We often say that bridge is such a great game because we can play against the best in the world whereas most golfers can never hope to play against Tiger Woods. These players, whom you can see most Thursday nights playing in the best unit game in the country, show that not only can we play against the best in the world, at least some times we can also beat them! So whenever you feel like it is not worth entering some event because you can "never" win, remember Nashville and the great record the WBL players put up there.

In addition to the winner receiving a free play at the WBL Unit Game, Steve will play with anyone who gets a perfect score or who exactly matches all five of his answers. If you send a self-addressed stamped envelope to the above address along with your answers, I will send you a copy of the new problems to ensure that you can meet his next deadline. You can pick up a copy of the problems at the WBL Unit Game in Maryland, and can send answers or requests for problems to robinswr@erols.com. You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter

how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

#### 1) IMPs. You're Vulnerable

When partner opens one-of-a-minor and RHO bids two-of-the-other-minor or three-of-the-other-minor, you would like to have two four-card majors to make a negative double. However, sometimes you are only dealt one four-card major. A negative double of two-of-a-minor or three-of-a-minor shows both majors or one major and support for partner's minor. In this problem you have one major and support for partner's diamonds. On good days, partner bids hearts.

This is a poor day. Partner bid 3♠ and he's allowed to do so with a sound minimum hand. I would bid 3♠ holding ♠ Axxx♥ Kxx ♠ KQxx♠ xx. Where do you want to play opposite a weak notrump hand like that? Do you play the seven-card spade fit or do you go back to the known eight-card or longer diamond fit?

Two experts join me and show a nongame forcing hand with diamonds and hearts. Partner is allowed to continue but there will be many hands where partner will struggle to make 4.

Woolsey: "4♦ —I would never make a negative double with a doubleton spade, so partner should have a good idea of my shape. Anything he does is likely to be right. 4♣ would not be choice of games — it would be a slam-try in spades. How else could you make a slam try if you have a strong hand with a four-card spade suit? "

Schwartz: "4♦ —Even if 4♣ was interpreted as a choice of games, it won't solve the problem as when you remove 4♥, partner won't expect you to be using it to find a 4-3 spade fit and would thus play you for the real deal. Partner needs a perfect fit for 5♦ to be right opposite a 12-14 hand even with the expected 4-5 in the pointed suits and bidding only 4♦ still leaves room to find a profitable 4-3 spade fit."

Two experts attempt to play a 4-3 spade fit. 4♠ will make if partner has ♠ AQJx ♥ xx♦ KQxxx♣ xx but if partner has ♠ Axxx ♥ Kxx♦ KQxx♣ xx -800 is possible.

**Cappelletti:** "4♠ —4-3 fit with AAK probably better than 5♦ or 3NT."

Parker: "44 —I would never make a negative double with this hand, I would bid 34 showing a limit raise or better in diamonds. But since I have promised the majors I will bid on. Partner should be 5-4 in diamonds and spades so ten tricks should be a good bet. He should win five diamonds, three spades, a club and a heart."

Four experts cue bid. Not sure what that will accomplish other than getting too high. I think 4\* would be a slam-try cuebid rather then a choice-of-games cuebid. Since opener would very likely interpret 4\* as a slam try, he will not help you get to your

best strain.

Adams: "4♣ —My first instinct is to bid 3NT, but that has no guarantee, and we might be cold for a slam with 3NT down. ♠ AQJx♥ A♦ Kxxxxx♣ xx produces a grand slam in diamonds, and that is only 14 HCP. Can partner have a balanced minimum weak notrump for the 3♠ bid? Yes, but seems less likely on the bidding."

If partner had ♠ AQJx♥ A♦ Kxxxxx♣ xx he would have bid 4♠.

Landen: "4♣ —Tough problem Pass, 3NT, 4♠ or 4♠ might be right. I won't pass as 4♠ is probably a safer partscore than 3♠. I'll bid 4♣ hope partner takes it as choice of games; 4♠ or 5♠. When in doubt, take the slight overbid at IMPS."

Roman: "4♣—Pick a game. Second choice is 5♦, but maybe he has ♠ AQJx ♥ xxx♦ KOxxx♣ x."

If partner had  $\triangle$  AQJx $\forall$  xxx $\Diamond$  KQxxx $\triangle$  x, he would jumped to  $4\triangle$  over  $3\triangle$ .

Wang: "4♣—Not sure which spot, 4♠, 5♦ or 6♦ is the best."

One expert tries 3NT. If partner has AQJx♥ xxx♦ KQxx♣ xx, you have nine top tricks. But what if he has the king of hearts instead of the ♠ QJ or the ♦ K?

Hopkins: "3NT—I'm hoping for something like ♠ AQxx♥ Qx♠ KQxxx♣ xx in partner's hand. The good news is we aren't likely to get a Heart lead even if the suit is wide open. The bad news is that we are likely to have to take nine tricks right away before losing the lead, assuming they knock out our one Club stopper right away. I do worry about missing a slam opposite something like ♠ AQxx♥ AKx♠ KQxxx♣ x, but think partner should have either bid more strongly last time or continue on after my 3NT call."

After 1 - 2, 1 - 3, 1, 1 - 2 and 1 - 3, a negative double shows both majors or shows one major and support for opener's minor.

You have a very strong hand with no clear action. Partner could have as little as ♠ QJxxx♥ x♦ Qxx♣ Qxxx where you would be lucky to make game or he could have **♦** AQJxxx♥ x♦ Kxxx♣ xx where 6♠ is cold. When the opponents have bid and raised a suit, the chances are great that you don't have a stack. The percentage way to play doubles of bid and raised suits is for the double to say - Partner we belong in some game since I have extra strength but I don't know where we belong, maybe you know. That's what you want to say here. If partner has a good five-card spade suit or six spades, spades is a playable suit. If partner has poor spades, you want to play in a minor, probably clubs but you could belong in diamonds. If partner has heart values he can defend.

Six experts join me and double.

Adams: "Double—This is card showing. Partner should be well placed to decide. If I bid 4♠, partner may guess wrong over 5♥."

**Landen:** "Double—Too much beef to pass and not enough offence or clear direction to bid. Maybe partner will know what to do."

**Wang:** "Double—This should be optional. The other option is 4NT. Nothing is perfect here. Hope partner can understand my situation."

**Hopkins:** "Double—This should show cards and leaves the greatest number of possibilities open. Partner can pull with a long Spade suit or other highly distributional hand. I think it just too unilateral to insist on playing five-of-a-minor with this hand."

**Schwartz:** "Double—Shows a good hand without primary spade support and leaves all options on the table."

**Roman:** "Double—And I'll be happy with whatever partner does. Do you and your partner agree on what 4NT would be here?

For my regular partner and me, it would be to pick a minor."

My rule on the meanings of 4NT in competition is - if a major has been bid, 4NT is RKC otherwise 4NT is for takeout.

Three experts make the game choice themselves. One expert bids 4♠. Couldn't partner bid 1♠ holding ♠ Jxxxx♥ Ax♠ Kx ♣ Oxxx?

**Parker:** "4. —Once again I owe partner a spade, but he has at least five and hopefully six. I will try for ten tricks rather than eleven in clubs. Hopefully he has good spade spots, QJ10xx(x), and the diamond king will help. He should have two or three hearts, so we should have a good play for ten tricks."

Two experts bid 5♣. Couldn't partner bid 1♠ holding ♠ AQJxxx♥ xx♠ Kxxx♣ x?

**Cappelletti:** "5♣—Unless we play that 1♠ guarantees five then 4♠."

Woolsey: "5♣—I can't pass, and this hand says to declare rather than defend. Saying that double shows "cards" is begging the question. Double is a statement that you think defending is best. It would be nice if 4NT were takeout, but once partner has bid 1♠ that makes 4NT RKC for spades."

Its nice for double of  $4 \blacktriangledown$  as penalties when you pick up  $\spadesuit x \blacktriangledown$  AKQ $\spadesuit$  Qxxx $\clubsuit$  Axxxx but the chances of you holding that hand is somewhere around slim.

Play double of bid and raised suits as - I have extra strength but I don't know where we belong, maybe you know.

Partner has made a balancing takeout double asking you to bid a black suit. Great! You have two black doubletons. What does partner have? If partner had 5-5 in the black suits, he would have bid 2♥ over 1NT so we can rule out 5-5. Since he should have enough strength to make a takeout double, he must not have the distribution to double. A doubleton diamond would stop him from doubling 1NT. Since he can't have five spades or six clubs, his distribution must be exactly 4-2-2-5. He probably has five clubs but that would land you in a seven-card fit at the three-level. It would be suicidal to bid a black suit. When any bid can land you in a poor spot, you might as well go for the gusto and pass the double. -470 if they make is better than -500 if all the cards are against you.

Five experts attempt to find a reasonable resting spot. If they don't get doubled, it will probably end up as a small loss. One expert plays a 4-2 fit. If you're in trouble 2. is better than 3. since it's harder to double a two-level bid.

**Cappelletti:** "2 — Since partner passed over 1NT, he is weak and shapely, perhaps weak 5-5 blacks."

Two experts bid  $3\clubsuit$ . Could be a six-card fit and three-level bids are easier to double.

Parker: "3♣ —Partner did not overcall 2♠ so I guess he has only four. His distribution figures to be 4225 with a pretty good hand. I don't think I have a good chance to beat them since they probably have four diamonds winners to go with the three hearts and a spade or a club winner."

**Roman:** "3♣—I can't come up with a hand for partner where it's right either to defend or bid 2♠. If bridge was always like these five problems, I would take up Parcheesi."

One expert sticks his neck out. If I were going to bid at the three-level, I would start with 2NT. Gives partner the option of passing with a balanced hand.

**Landen:** "3♦ — Pass is a joke, so 3♦ obvious (2NT usually played as takeout?)"

Hopkins: "2NT—I hope to take fourblack suit tricks to go with my two Heart tricks (say opposite ♣ A10xx♥ xx♦ Jx ♣ KJ9xx) and get out for -300. It even leaves open the possibility of playing in Clubs if partner has six or a very good fivecard suit. I do not fancy my prospects in 2♥ doubled."

Four experts join me and defend. On good days the opponents will be in a sevencard heart fit and will go for a large number. This will be an opening lead problem for the passers.

**Woolsey:** "Pass—Presumably the reason partner didn't double the first time was that his diamond holding wasn't adequate. We should have a reasonable chance to defeat this and we have zero chance to get a plus score elsewhere. This isn't close."

Adams: "Pass—Partner is probably 4-2-2-5 with a decent hand. We might or might not beat this, but I can't bring myself to bid a doubleton. Dummy will be the same 4-2-2-5, and declarer will be 3-5-4-1. Partner can't have six clubs for failure to act over 1NT, nor can he be 4-1-3-5 for the same reason. With the assumed distributions, our best hope for tricks is in spades and hearts, so I will hope we have six tricks in our 4-2 heart fit, rather than eight in our 4-2 spade fit."

Wang: "Pass—Partner's first pass should deny 5-5 in the black suits (he would have bid 2♥) or six+ clubs (he would have overcalled 2♣) or 4-1-3-5 (he would have doubled 1NT). So, likely partner has 4-2-2-5 shape, Law of Total Tricks is on our side, especially since I have good middle cards in hearts."

**Schwartz:** "Pass—Partner's bid is takeout of diamonds so the most likely shape is 4-2-2-5 without particularly good clubs. If partner's hand is poor enough that 2♥ is making, then you are going for a big number in your contract anyway."

You can't make a living passing takeout doubles but when all alternatives could be disastrous, passing becomes least of all evils.

Partner has shown a good hand with long diamonds and exactly four hearts. If he had five hearts, he would have bid Michaels. There are two problems to consider - strain and level. We probably belong in  $4 \spadesuit$  but stopping in  $4 \spadesuit$  could be a problem. If you bid  $4 \spadesuit$  and partner is 4-7 or 4-8 in the reds, he might not let you out at  $4 \spadesuit$  and could bid one more, thinking he has found diamond support.  $4 \spadesuit$  might be the best contract but bidding  $4 \spadesuit$  is not the way to get to  $4 \spadesuit$ .

Two experts bid their seven-card suit. Bidding 4\* tells partner that it's a misfit.

Schwartz: "4. —Its tempting to try for the golden apple of 3NT but if it isn't right, it could go down many and make it easier for the opponents to double. 4. should make it easiest to get to our best minor as partner with seven good diamonds and a stiff club will remove anyway."

**Cappelletti:** "4♣ — Might even catch partner with two if he's 0-5-6-2."

Three experts bid  $4 \spadesuit$ .  $4 \spadesuit$  is more encouraging than 3NT or  $4 \clubsuit$ .  $4 \spadesuit$  shows support.

Roman: "4 — Partner didn't start with double, I can't imagine what else I would do here."

**Parker:** "4♦ —Partner should not be 5-5 or 6-5, since he could have bid Michaels. He may be 6-4 or 7-5."

Wang: "4♦ — Partner's 3♥ said he is not afraid of 4♦. Partner is at least 4-6 in red suits, more likely 4-7 or even 5-7 in the two suits."

Four experts join me and bid 3NT. Might make if partner has ♠ x♥ Axxx♠ AQJxxxx ♣ x. If 3NT gets doubled, we will be in scrambling mode. That should stop partner from bidding 5♠. Unless an opponent has a sure diamond trick or five sure tricks, 3NT will be impossible to double. How can you double 3NT when there is a

long suit involved?

**Woolsey:** "3NT—I have spade stopper, and I have the filling ◆ K. If partner passes, I expect this to have a decent shot. Besides, what else is better?"

Adams: "3NT—Partner is probably 4-7, and 3NT just might make. ♦ K is huge. I can hardly have more for my failure to bid over 2♠."

Landen: "3NT—I have a pretty good hand opposite a partner who has forced me to the four-level. The king of diamonds might be enough to run the suit. If partner returns to 4♦ I'm content. If it doesn't work out, I can tell partner 3NT was choice of minors (LOL)"

**Hopkins:** "3NT—I am hoping partner is fishing with something like ♠ x♥ AKxx ♠ AQJ10xx♠ Qx and I have just enough. I should be showing a card and a stopper for this auction, as I did not raise diamonds before. I hope partner pulls with a widely distributional hand."

Don't encourage partner on misfit hands.

Twenty points and you have to enter the fray at the three-level. Holding a singleton spade doesn't make it easy to enter. If you double, partner, who has at least five spades, will bid them and where would that get you? Partner will bid spades, you'll bid diamonds, he'll rebid spades and there you are in 5♦. Do you want to play in 3♦ or

5♦? If partner has nothing, you have two aces to lose and at least one diamond loser. I'd want to play in 3♦. Plus scores are better than minus scores.

Three experts join me and make a minimum overcall.

Wang: "3♦ —Yes I got twenty HCP, but no clear game. With singleton Spade, double is out. 3NT is hopeless. We need partner's support to run diamonds and ♠ K or ♥ A to provide ninth trick, if so play five or 6♦ is much better. The most likely game is 4♥ if partner has four hearts (4♥ is my second choice if really want to bid game), or 5♦ if partner has Kxxx of diamonds (higher requirement than making 4♥). There is another choice, 4♦, which is supposed to be Leaping Michael. After all, I go conservative and hope for a second chance."

**Hopkins:** "3♦ —I really want to bid 3♥, but that could go really wrong. 3NT just needs too much without some contribution from partner."

Maybe the best bid is  $4 \heartsuit$ . The opponents won't know that you have only four hearts and might not find the best defense.

Schwartz: "3♦ —The only way to get to hearts is via 4NT which is far too aggressive. Since double will almost certainly attract a spade bid, will bid it conservatively as the \*KO are not worth full offensive values."

Four experts violate the — don't make a takeout double when you have a singleton in

an unbid major — rule.

**Cappelletti:** "Double—Will bid 3NT over 3♠ and 5♠ over 4♠."

Woolsey: "Double—I'll then have to keep bidding diamonds over any number of spades partner bids. This is the only sensible way I can bring hearts into the picture, and 4♥ could easily be our only game."

**Landen:** "Double—Too much hand to bid only 3♦. If partner jumps to 4♠, I'll bid 5♦ and hope for the best."

**Roman:** "Double—And correct whatever number of spades partner bids to diamonds."

One expert makes up an understanding. Normally Leaping Michaels, jump to four-ofa-minor showing five of that minor and five of an unbid major, is only played over opening preempts.

Adams: "4♦ —Diamonds and a Major. Double risks partner insisting on Spades and 3NT is unlikely to make. 4♥ might just make on a 4-3. 3♦, seems overly conservative, but works if partner has a bust without heart fit. Tempting to just bid 4♥ and let them guess. Sorry, I had a diamond in with my hearts."

**Parker:** "4♦ —Should show a good hand and allows partner to bid a major, hopefully hearts, if he has one. 3NT has no tricks and double will lead to spades by partner."

Avoid making a takeout double when you're short in an unbid major.



#### REMEMBERING Rossi

~Memories compiled by Barbara Summers~

## Rosanita Lindstrom 'Rossi'

died August 13th from complications of cancer of the esophagus. Rossi played with so many different people, played so often, and yet always portrayed the best side of bridge through her intense love of the game and the community. She really was an ambassador for local bridge. She touched many of us...her partners making them feel good; always complimenting them in just the right way..so sincerely and so consistently. Opponents approached her table knowing though her demeanor was lovely that she and her partners would wield the axe if one should make a misstep and get a deserved low score. Clyde Krystal remembers that even before he knew Rossi, she would come up to him in games where he had done well and congratulate him. Arnie Frankel, who ran into Rossi when he was pacing the halls at 4 a.m. in Lancaster when she was out in the hall discussing bridge (yes, 4 a.m.), began playing with her, talking bridge by phone - rarely for less than an hour. He never met anyone with whom he disagreed so often, yet had such affection for. Jim Allen felt one could learn a lot by following Rossi's lead. She had fabulous table manners and table presence. She was exceptionally ethical and always told her opponents when there was a bidding misunderstanding so that they would not be fooled. Rossi knew about point counting. She had hand evaluations, promoted valuations, valuations after the bidding started and methods of calculating points for flaws, tight honors, unprotected honors, length and good holdings. Once when asked about bidding she simply said, "It is really just mathematical." There is no way to describe her glee with winning, or being with a partner she respected, or being willing to share her knowledge. Ted Ying recalled that Rossi always greeted him with, "Oh, I'm so delighted to see you" and a



great big hug. Danny Wang added that Rossi was the nicest bridge partner he ever had and that she never said any disparaging word or made a face when he made a mistake. He attributed part of her success as a bridge player, beside her technical expertise and unfailing courtesy to her partner, to her strict discipline in bidding. She had certain rigid rules that were never to be broken, so she and her partner would be on the same wave length most of the time. Many players remember Rossi for her knitting. She was a professional finisher for a local crafts store and her work was in high demand. She was a fast player and usually had time at the end of a round and sometimes when she was dummy to knit. Most of us have a difficult enough time playing, let alone knitting.

Rossi was a champion accumulating over 8800 master points..of the nearly 160,000 players in the ACBL, fewer than 600 had more points than Rossi and despite that high total, she still reveled in winning even a quarter of a point in a local game. She won tournaments and most often won or placed in our unit game. Marie Creisher who played regularly with her online at Bridge Base tells that Rossi accumulated 850 ACBL points and was ranked 10th in online bridge. If her scheduled partner canceled she would get a ring "Wake Up Time." to substitute. Barbara Rothkin in Roosevelt, California, and one of Rossi's regular online partners was asked by the chief director what Rossi's favorite game was. She answered, "From 8 in the morning to 8 in the evening!"

Rossi and her husband Gary have three kids, six grand kids and another on the way. Rossi auditioned for a starring role in a show at Leisure World where she and Gary moved in 2003, won the role but decided it was too much of a commitment of time...and she could dance...loved jig saw puzzles, any challenge was her forte. She loved theatre and never missed a performance from Ted Ying.

Both in the online bridge community and the active local bridge community, Rossi was a favorite of the Directors, had many partners who loved her and opponents who admired both her skill and her demeanor. We are going to miss her so much.

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#### JULY 4TH IN BETHESDA REGIONAL WRAP-UP

#### **GRAND NATIONAL TEAMS** 2007-2008 YOU MUST PREREGISTER!

It's time to get out to your local club and qualify to win a subsidized trip to Las Vegas, at the Summer 2008 NABC to represent District 6 in the national finals of this grassroots competition.

ALERT: Due to more stringent residency requirements, any individual who is unsure which District he/she is a resident of as of September 1, 2007, must seek clarification from the ACBL Credentials Committee prior to the start of the event.

The club qualification period begins on October 15, 2007 and extends through April 3, 2008. District-level competition for all flights except the 0-5000 flight begins in February. So make sure you qualify early. However, you can go out and play as often as you want with whomever you want!!

Once again, the competition will contain four flights at the District level. The Open **Flight** is open to all players; **Flight A** is limited to players with 0-5000 master points; **Flight B** is limited to players with 0-2000 master points; and Flight C is limited to Non-Life Masters with fewer than 500 master points. Master point eligibility is determined by the ACBL as of August 6, 2007. At the club level, the Open and A flights will be combined.

Masterpoints awarded at the club level are half red-an easy way to earn colored points without traveling or changing your normal local playing habits. In the district level competition, the match awards are red and the overall awards are gold (Flight C awards 25% gold and 75% red).

Remember, players qualify as individuals at the club level and may form new teams with qualified players for the District phase of the competition. What this means is that you can play with all of your friends at the club level, no matter what their flight eligibility, and then form one or more teams to compete in one or more flights at the District level. So y'all come out and play!

Call your club manager to find out when the club is holding qualifying games. As club dates are made available to the District GNT Coordinator, they will be posted on the District 6 web site, www.districtsix.org.

We will be holding the first weekend of the District finals of Flight B (0-2000) and Flight C (NLM 0-500) at three separate locations on February 9-10:

a. Christ the King Church Silver Spring, Md

b. Peninsula Bridge Club Newport News, Va

c. Best Western Cavalier Charlottesville, Va

Your team can choose to play at any one of these three locations.

The second weekend will be at one location on March 1-2:

Christ the King Church Silver Spring, Md

Both weekends of the **Open Fight** will be at Christ the King Church in Silver Spring, Md on February 9-10 and March 1-2.

The first weekend, April 5-6, of **Flight A** (0-5000) will be at Christ the King Church in Silver Spring, Md. The second weekend, April 12-13, will be during the NVBA sectional in Fairfax, Va.

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#### WITH SIX POINTS, FIND A BID!

When partner opens with one of a suit, she probably has at least 12 points, but she could have as many as 21. Maybe she's just shy of a strong 24 opening, or she doesn't have the right shape to open 2NT. She might need only five or six points from you to bid game. If you have six points or more and partner opens, you must find a bid!

#### Support with support

When partner opens one of a major and you have three or more of his suit, your job is to let him know! With a relatively weak hand, supporting partner's major should be your number one priority. Bidding partner's major at the two level shows 6-9 points and three-card (or longer) support. Usually, with 6-9 points you'll only get one chance to bid, so tell partner what he needs to know.

Hand 1 is worth only 8 points, so bid 2♥ over partner's 1♥ opening to show him your minimum raise. He doesn't need to know about your spades. They'll be a nice bonus when the dummy comes down!

Hand 2 can add three dummy points because of the shortness in clubs. (Remember to always add distribution points when you and partner have a fit!) This hand is too strong for a simple (one-level) raise. Many players would bid 3♥ with these cards, showing 10-12 points and four-card trump support.

With 10 or more points and only three trumps, you may need to bid another suit and then bid partner's major at the appropriate level. Hand 3 is worth 11 points, too strong to bid  $2\Psi$  when pard opens  $1\Psi$ , but you can't bid 3♥ if, by partnership agreement, that bid promises four trumps. Bid 24 and support hearts later. Remember that when you bid a new suit as responder, it's forcing for one round if you haven't passed originally. Sometimes you need two or more bids to describe your hand.

#### Show a new suit at the one level

When partner opens one of a minor, you know he doesn't have a five-card major, but he may have a four-card major. If you have four cards in either major, how can you find out if partner has a fit with you? Opener needs a five-card suit to open her major, but responder gets a discount: responder needs to hold only four! Someone has to be able to bid their major with four if you're going to find

With 6-9 points, you're not strong enough to bid a new suit at the two level, so you'll need to bid a suit that's higher than the one partner opened. Normally we bid four card suits "up the line." That means that if you have two four-card suits, you bid the lowerranking one first, as long as you can bid it at the one level. However, some players will bypass their four-card diamond suit to bid a major instead, since it's easier to get to game in a major suit than in a minor.

With Hand 4, bid 1♥ when partner opens in either minor, giving pard the chance to bid 1 if she has four spades but not four hearts. With Hand 5, I would always bid 1♥ if partner opened 1♣, but some partnerships might agree to bid 1♦ instead.

I would even bid 1♥ over 1♦ with this hand! (Or 2♥ over 1♥.) Once we've found a fit, this hand is worth 7 points, and it's very likely that we do have a fit if pard opens 1♦.

If she rebids  $1 \spadesuit$ , 1NT or  $2 \clubsuit$ , correct to  $2 \spadesuit$ : she's likely to have four of them.

#### **Bid 1NT**

If you can't support partner's suit, you have no suit to bid at the one level, and you're not strong enough to bid at the two level, you still need to bid if you have six points. Bid 1NT! Responding 1NT doesn't promise a balanced hand, and it doesn't promise stoppers in the unbid suits: it merely tells partner that you have 6-9 points and you can't support his suit.

With Hand 7, you can raise if pard opens a major, but if he opens in a minor, bid 1NT. (Even if he opens 1♣, don't raise to 2♣: he may have only a three-card suit.) If you're holding Hand 8 and pard opens 14, you must bid 1NT even though you have a singleton! You have no suit you can bid at the one level.

#### Can I ever pass with six points when partner opens?

Yes! In a competitive auction the rules are different. When pard opens and your right-

hand opponent overcalls, or makes a bid over your partner's bid, you can pass with just 6 or 7 points. Partner will have another opportunity to describe her hand.

If partner overcalls, she hasn't opened... there's only one opener and responder in any auction. When pard overcalls you can raise with 6, but you need more than the minimum to bid a new suit. When the opponents are bidding, you need to be more conservative.

In bridge, there's a huge difference between completely broke and six points. When partner opens and you have six points or more, find a bid!
