Member Spotlight – Russell Schoudt



Russell Schoudt was raised in Alexandria Virginia and started playing bridge was when he was just 10 years old. His parents were social bridge players, who taught him how to play in the evenings. He was interested in the game and enjoyed learning, but since he was an onlychild there weren't many opportunities for actual games until he got to high school and found friends who liked to play.

Russell went to Duke in 1964 and found other people who enjoyed playing social bridge. They played late in the evenings with the losers of the first rubber buying the snacks. He was a Civil Engineering major and graduated in 1968 at the height of the Vietnam war. He joined the Air Force and flew over 200 combat missions as a forward air controller.

The first time he played duplicate bridge was after returning to the states in 1973. He was stationed at Fort Walton Beach Florida where he occasionally played in the evenings with other officers and their wives. Friends in this group introduced him to duplicate. He played a dozen or so times while living there but never joined the ACBL. It probably didn't matter because he won less than a point, then got out of the service and moved. The highlight of this period was when he won a half point during a club event. He was playing with an 'older woman' --- who was almost 40--, and after they won she shocked him by standing up and giving him a big hug. Apparently, the half point put her over the top... and she made life master.

After getting out of the Air Force Russell moved to Texas, where he stayed from 1974 till 2007. During this time, he married his wife Tina --- in Paris Illinois--, started raising 11 cats and had no time for playing bridge. He still had an interest in the game but could only express it by reading the bridge

column in the local paper. He was too busy working as a project manager for multiple Engineering and Constructions companies doing design/build work for Oil refineries, Chemical and Natural Gas plants. Most of the time he was in Texas, but he also visited job sites in Iran, Australia, Mexico and Venezuela.

Russell retired in 2005; he and his wife Tina moved to Durham in 2007. His wife volunteered at Duke Gardens where she was friendly with a woman whose husband was interested in bridge. The two women had a common interest, they wanted their husbands out of the house, and so Russell was introduced to Mark Webbink. They have been playing bridge a few times a week ever since.

The highlight of Russell's playing career was when he and Mark won a 0-300 game in 2016 and came in 4th nationally in the Common Game.

Russell has 445 master points, but not many are gold. He enjoys the faceto-face games more than online but he doesn't travel much so he doesn't expect to make Life Master. He currently plays at the bridge academy three times a week, enjoys the interaction with the other players and actually *appreciates* comments from the more experienced players. He, like most of us, is hopeful that the attendance numbers pick up and that the local game rebounds and we can get back to bigger crowds.


