Member Spotlight - Norma Lande

Sandwiched between a brother and sister, Norma Lande was born in Boston, Massachusetts. Prior to moving to Chapel Hill, she has also lived in Marblehead, Massachusetts; Portland, Maine; San Francisco, California; and The Villages in Florida. After high school she attended Business School and was secretary for a CPA firm, then a law firm, before being rehired back to the CPA firm.

It was during her second employment that a friend introduced her to bridge. As a former Whist player, the transition to bridge

was quick and enjoyable. As typical of many of us, she was very nervous at her first duplicate game but became very interested in the game. Through the years she took lessons from many teachers including Ernest Revere who wrote a bridge book in the '60s.

Along the way, Norma traveled for 4 ½ months through 17 European countries enjoying the many sights, adventures, and people. On a boat trip from Greece to Israel she met a charming gentleman who moved to the US. They subsequently married.

Later Norma married her second love with whom she had a daughter who lives in Chapel Hill with her husband and sons— The reason Norma subsequently moved here. She is very happy in her 55+ community where all kind of card games are played in a group setting nightly.

Norma and her second husband who was a very good player and even taught some classes played a lot of bridge particularly when they lived in the Villages in Florida. <u> 2023-2024 Unit 191 Mentoring Program Plan</u>

- Schedule for Games: Two games per month a face-to-face (F2F) game at 10:00 a.m. on the 2nd Tuesday of each month and an online BBO game at 7:00 p.m. on the 4th Tuesday of each month.
- Game Fee: \$11 per player for the face-to-face (F2F) games and 5 BB\$ per player for the online BBO games.
- Mentors: Mentors may or may not be Unit 191 members.
- Subsidy for Mentors: Unit 191 will subsidize \$5 of the mentor's game fee for mentors playing with a Unit 191 mentee in the F2F games. The subsidy will not apply to the online games, nor when the mentee is not a member of Unit 191.

Mentoring Pairs Game Fee in F2F games: \$17 when mentee is a Unit 191 member

\$22 if mentee is not a Unit 191 member

- Mentees: Mentees must be non-Life Masters with fewer than 500 masterpoints as of the September start date. Mentees may or may not be Unit 191 members.
- Mentees are encouraged to pay their Mentor's entry fee, if any.
- Lessons:
- A 30-minute lesson will precede the F2F games, from 9:15 to 9:45.
 Lessons are on various topics, possibly including the bidding & play of an interesting hand.
- After each M/M game we will ask several Mentors to write comments on some of the interesting hands. Comments will be posted on the web site.

Bidding a Difficult Slam (and Making it). Marc Goldberg

At a recent club game, North picked up a promising hand.

- **♠** AQJ43
- AKQJT6
- A
- **4** 4

What a nice hand! A two-loser hand for those of you who use losing trick count. You may not need any help from partner to make 6 of something, and 7 is not out of the question if he has the right cards. You plan to open 2\(\Phi\) until you notice that you are not the dealer. East is, and after two passes, West opens 1Dbefore you have a chance to say anything.

So now what? Given that West opened and North has 21 HCPs, North can count on South to be somewhere between broke and not having much. South and East might have only 5-7 HCPs between them. What are North's bidding options?

- Overcalling 1♥ is a poor bid. As an overcaller, that bid is not forcing, and
 North would hate to see South pass. Overcalling 4♥ is also a poor bid. South
 will definitely pass that bid. Game will easily make, but the pair might miss
 a slam. Maybe just bid 6♥ and be done with it, hoping that partner
 has a card that will help. It would be nice to try to be a bit more scientific
 than that.
- North could try a Michaels bid of 2 → and hope that North has a 3-card major to advance with. That might work, butSouth might bid 2 → with only two cards. Plus, it would be much better if North is the declarer to keep all those high card points hidden.

 A takeout double may be a good way to start- see what South has to say. If East passes, South must bid (unless he has a terrific diamond stack that he wants to convert to penalty). If South bids a major, North can use 4NT to ask for key cards. Six is probably cold if South has the K♠ or A♠, and seven might make if South has both cards (all the outstanding pointsnot likely, but possible).

East passes and in response to the takeout double, South bids 2.

Now what? North still has a quandary. Double and bid 2♥shows 17+ and South could pass (very likely). Double and bid 4♥ will probably end the bidding. Double and bid 3♥ might get the point across to South that hearts are trump and you want partner to say something. South might control bid a suit, but more likely will bid 4♥ showing his week hand and telling North to shut up already.

If North bids 4NT over South's $2\clubsuit$, South might take that as key card asking for clubs. With none, South will bid $5\spadesuit$. Will $5\clubsuit$ by North then be Queen asking? The bidding could get confusing. Sometimes, you just have to be bold and hope it works out. Here is how the bidding went at our table.

East led a diamond, and the dummy came down. How should North play the hand?

- **♦** T97
- **9** 872
- ♦ J76
- **♣** KJ75
- **♠** AQJ43
- AKQJT6
- A
- **4**

Before calling for a diamond from dummy, North should make a plan. He has no diamond losers and no heart losers. He has one club loser and a possible spade loser. There is no hope for eliminating the club

loser. Since West has almost all the outstanding points, he will surely take the $A \clubsuit$ against a slam contract. So, the only hope to make $6 \heartsuit$ is to get to the dummy and finesse West for the $K \spadesuit$. The key to the plan is reaching the dummy.

Before revealing the winning play, I will point out that three of five tables were in 6, and all went down one (your author, included). Nothing is more frustrating than making a brilliant bid and then not making a sure contract. Learn from your mistakes- this one was painful and won't happen again. Play slow enough to analyze each card.

The play should have been easy.

Win the diamond lead with the A♦.

Play the A \checkmark . It collects the 3 \checkmark , 2 \checkmark , 9 \checkmark .

Stop and think- count trump to see how the four outstanding hearts will split.


Play the K \blacktriangledown . It collects the 4 \blacktriangledown , 7 \blacktriangledown , 3 \clubsuit (darn, trump split is 3-1. I was hoping for 2-2).

Stop and think- recall that the 9♥ fell on the first heart trick, making the 8♥ in dummy a winner. (oops- I missed that step).

Play a low heart to the 8♥ to draw the last trump. Thus the key to getting to dummy.

Finesse West for the $K \spadesuit$ (start with the $10 \spadesuit$, then the $9 \spadesuit$, and then the $7 \spadesuit$) and claim when the $K \spadesuit$ falls.

Here are all 4 hands:
