From the desk of the Unit President:

Wow! What a successful sectional tournament we had! Since 2020, our Unit organized sectional tournaments that ranged in total table count from 132-144 tables. That was what we expected and prepared for. Thursday night started us off with the expected turnout — 14 teams. But Friday and Saturday mornings we were shocked! We had not had more than 30 tables in any single session since before the pandemic. Friday morning - 38 tables! We managed and took a breath at noon. Friday is generally our high attendance day. Then Saturday morning came and wham!!!! 41 tables!

Overall, the tournament hosted 190 tables! Fifty more tables than we have seen since 2019! As **Marie Killoran** said "There was no way to anticipate or prepare for such a change." Now for the best detail! For Friday and Saturday morning sessions, we had **20 and 19 tables** in the limited section (0-750 masterpoints). But truthfully, we actually had 18-19 tables of players with fewer than 500 masterpoints. Those players are the future of the game! We were so happy to host that many novice players! Thank you all for coming!

It has been two weeks since, and all of the volunteers are still recovering. Many hours of work go into running such a tournament and The Board is so thankful for everyone who helped in some way. We are so grateful for all who attended a session and for all who volunteered. We were grateful for everyone's patience as we found a way to accommodate that many extra players for the bigger sessions.

Going forward, the venue worked out pretty well. If we choose to rent that space again, we will expand to the second room and have an assistant director on hand so that we can spread people out and better accommodate everyone.

In December, the Board of Directors will be making decisions about our schedule for 2026. Stay tuned for an updated tournament schedule.

BOARD 27 FROM A CLUB GAME

You end up in a 4H contract after West has shown a long spade suit. East eagerly tables the 8 of spades. What's your plan?


From the lead it is clear West has the spade K. You are in danger of losing 2 club tricks and a spade. Also you can see your spade winner being trumped as well. You must handle the trumps carefully. You can try to drop Q doubleton or fi nesse. With spade length in West, it is more likely East has

longer hearts. There are some scenarios where West may have a Q, so leading to the heart A seems best, leaving your options to finesse East or drop the Q.

You take the spade A and play a low heart to the Ace paying particular attention to the card West plays. West shows out! As the cards lie, East is guaranteed a heart trick. You must eliminate your spade loser. Play a low heart to the J and then play the K, leaving East with their Q winner. Run the diamonds, as long as the diamond J falls, you can pitch your spades on the 3rd and 4th diamond. It matters little whether East trumps the last diamond or not. You have a ruffing finesse on the spade K. Contract made losing the heart Q and 2 club

tricks.. Well played.

Here is the whole hand, There is a case for West preempting to 3 spades depending on the auction, but that turned out poorly at the club and in the common game.



Dear Bridge Players,

Unit 191's bridge mentoring program continued in November. The program sponsors games in person, at Triangle Bridge Academy, and online, on BBO. The in-person games have two tiers. Tier I is for mentees with fewer than 250 masterpoints playing with mentors who have fewer than 500 masterpoints. Tier II is for mentees with fewer than 500 masterpoints; mentors are unlimited.

Refreshments are provided by a crew of volunteers — Ray Boylan, Ann Fisher, Martha Schulwitz, and Maggie Smith — to whom we offer our appreciation. They are always looking for more volunteers. Please email one of them if you can help. Tier I plays on the 4th Tuesday of each month at 10 AM, preceded by an optional lesson from Henry Meguid at 9:15.

The November game was on Tuesday, November 25 and had five tables. Congratulations to **Gerri Stanczyk** and **Ray McEntee** who had a big score of nearly 66%. Note: the December game will be on the 16th, the third Tuesday, to avoid conflict with the holiday that falls in the fourth week.
