Improved 4-Way Minor Suit Transfers Henry Meguid

General Structure

- 2♠ is Stayman and always promises a 4-card major.
- 2♦is a transfer to hearts (announced as hearts).
- 2♥ is a transfer to spades (announced as spades).
- 1NT- 2NT is a transfer to a six-card diamond suit (announced as a diamonds). You give up 1NT-2NT bid as an 8-9 HCP invitational notrump raise.
- 1NT-2♠ is a transfer to clubs **or** a notrump size-ask bid with 8-9 pts and no 4-card major. (**Alertable**)
- 1NT-3NT shows 10+ HCP with or without a six-card minor suit (Don't transfer.)
- 1NT-3♠ or 3♦ shows a six-card suit, a strong hand, and slam interest. The opener bids a control up the line. (Partnership agreement is required for this treatment.)

The 2NT Response

- The opener **accepts the transfer** when holding an honor third or better in diamonds. (**Bid it if you like it.**) The responder can pass with a weak hand with diamonds or bid 3NT.
- The opener **rejects the transfer** by bidding 3♠. Responder corrects to 3♦ to play.

The 2♠ Response

- 1NT 2Φ = Asks the opener about the size of the 1NT. Responder is holding a weak hand with a six-card club suit or an invitational hand with 8-9 HCP.
- Opener's Responses
 - 2NT = minimum 15 or bad 16, i.e., would not accept an invitation to 3NT.
 Responder passes.
 - 3♠ = a good 16 or a maximum notrump hand, i.e., would accept an invitation to 3NT. The responder passes with a weak hand with clubs or bids 3NT.

Advantage

• The standard treatment of 4-way transfers requires responder with an 8-9 HCP hand to bid 2♠ (Stayman) and then bid 2NT over opener's response, which is announced as "may or may not have a 4-card major." Opponents now know information about opener's hand, e.g., does not have a 4-card major or does have a 4-card major which responder cannot support. With the improved treatment opponents know responder does not have a 4-card major but know nothing about majors in opener's hands.
