After a boat trip crossing the Atlantic landing in Montreal, the family traveled west to British Columbia by train. Sarah was impressed by the friendliness of her new homeland. They have 2 children and 4 grandkids aged 12 to 16. Norm worked in the paper/pulp industry and they lived in North Carolina and Arkansas for five years before returning to Canada. Norm is currently on a six month special project in Thunder Bay Canada. It is really cold in Thunder Bay.

Sarah and Norm have travelled extensively throughout the world. They met at a party after a basketball game and will be celebrating 50 years of marriage this June. She was the victor of a five sport event in her twenties - tennis, squash, racketball badminton and ping pong. Way to go with the hand-eye coordination. Now she enjoys golf, pickleball and bridge.

A fun fact - Sarah and Norm had tea in Buckingham Palace with Brigadier Sir Miles Hunt-Davis. Norm’s grandfather, Edmund LeCouvie, hand carved a replica of The Cosmo clipper ship out of ivory as a gift from the Province of Quebec to Queen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip as a Coronation gift. It is on display in a glass case and as relatives of Mr. LeCouvie, they were granted a visit to view it. (They didn't run into any royalty and exited with a tour of the basement).

History lesson: The clipper ship became popular in Baltimore around 1832 as a sleek and speedy merchant vessel. Also known as “flying clippers” earlier models originated before the Revolutionary War in Chesapeake Bay. The British used them for the tea and opium trade with China. They were also “popular” slave ships and could obtain a speed of 16 knots (18 miles per hour). The use of the clipper ship peaked in 1853 and were only built until 1860. The opening of the Suez Canal in 1859 and faster steam vessels took over all trade routes. Another popular route was from the east coast to California for the gold rush in 1849. The only remaining intact ship is the "Cutty Sark" in a Greenwich museum.

Buckingham Palace, the official royal residence in the heart of London, is 830,000 square feet and has over 775 rooms. The original home, started in 1624, was given to The Duke of Buckingham and Normandy in 1703 (a royal title since the Norman conquest by William and Conqueror in 1066). He was a descendent of King Henry VIII. George III obtained the home in 1761 for Queen Charlotte who had 15 children. It sits on 42 acres of land in London and is famous also for the royal annual summer garden parties. The Royal Mall and fountain were built to honor Queen Victoria and leads to the front of the palace with the famous view from the royal balcony. The Germans bombed the chapel during World War II. The current Duke of Normandy is King Charles III. Summer visits are allowed when royalty is not present. I went on the tour a few years ago and was very impressed (to say the least). On display was a replica of Prince William and Kate's wedding cake and her wedding gown.

Crane, who was murdered in July 1985, was ACBL's top master point holder and was acknowledged by his peers to be unequalled as a master point winner and a match point player. His influence on the race was dominant for more than three decades.

The ACBL tally for 2025 came out on January 6, and there were 7 Villages duplicate players who placed in the Barry Crane top 500 for 2025! Kudos to all of you for fine play!

Playing Cards **By Nancy Tessier**

The standard playing card suits of clubs, spades hearts and diamonds originated in France in the 15th century. Earlier German card suits were acorns, leaves hearts and bells. In Switzerland the suits were (and sometimes still are) acorns, flowers, shields and bells. The oldest suits on cards from Italy and Spain are coins, cups, swords and caiman style clubs all derived from the Middle East and North Africa. Back then, each suit consisted of 10 numbered cards and three ace cards - a king, a cavalier and a knave but no queen.

Book Review - Killer Angels by Michael Shaara **By Buck Buchanan**

Mauri showed me a magazine article listing the fifteen best historical novels. The No. 1 novel was Killer Angels by Michael Shaara. I have to tell you that Killer Angels is 40 years old. Not only that, but when I told Mauri I was thinking about writing a review of it, she tried to discourage me. She said it was too much war (It's actually more about people). The funny thing is, Mauri read it twice and absolutely loved it. I recently read it again, and it is a great read. If you haven't read it, read it and you'll love it, too.

Killer Angels is a Civil War novel, specifically the battle of Gettysburg in July, 1863. The Confederate army has begun to succeed under the leadership of Robert E Lee, and Lee has marched his Confederate troops into Pennsylvania. His goal is turn East once he gets past Gettysburg, which will put him in a position to attack Washington.

The flaw in his strategy is that he has hasn't planned on 80,000 Federal troops blocking his way in Gettysburg. A titanic three day battle follows. The first day battle is a wash, and on the second day, Lee plans to attack Little Round Top, the south end of the Union line, but General Joshua Chamberlain repels his attack. When his troops run out of ammunition, Chamberlain has his troops unsheathe their bayonets and lead a bayonet charge down the mountain.

The third day is the culmination of the battle. Lee has General George Pickett lead a mile-wide line of 40.000 Confederate soldiers into a line of well-fortified Union sharpshooters, and the result is a disaster for the Confederates. Of Pickett's top thirteen officers, seven are killed, and the remaining six are badly injured. Tens of thousands of Confederate soldiers are killed, and Lee has no choice but to begin a retreat which eventually leads to the Confederate surrender twenty months later at Appomattox.

It's a great book. Read it if you haven't read it.
