a number of the travelers spent a bit of time trying their luck in the casinos.

Because this was my first time at a Vegas bridge tournament, I had no idea what to expect. Here are some of my first impressions. The good news is that you can get great deals if you book your flight on Allegiant Air, who puts together flight-hotel packages with prices that are hard to beat. The bill for my flight and hotel for four nights was \$396.

If you want to travel a little around the strip but don't want to walk, use Uber rather than a taxi. I booked an Uber ride from Bally's to the airport on our way home, and it arrived in about 6 minutes and cost \$13.00.

Bally's Hotel and Casino, the tournament venue, leaves a bit to be desired. It's a bit "out-of-date" compared to many of the other venues in the area, although perhaps this helps keep hotel room costs down. It's a huge hotel-convention facility, and I wish I'd brought more comfortable shoes. A bottle of water in the hotel gift shop costs \$4, and there isn't a drinking fountain to be found. Thankfully, the tournament organizers provide fresh cold drinking water in the playing halls, but the only food service, from about 11:30 am-3:30 pm, charges \$5 for a cup of coffee. The hotel's food is moderately expensive, but good, and you can walk around the area without going outside to find just about anything your heart desires.

I could fill you in on a whole lot more, but I can't, since, as the slogan goes, "What happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas."
