There are marginal decisions with many possible outcomes. Here, for instance, North-South may stretch their assets in the auction by bidding hearts and locating their 4-4 fit. Their joy will be short-lived, however, when they discover the 5-0 split. Those who reach the sporting 4♥ are destined to fail by at least two tricks and may well be doubled.</p> <p>After North's opening bid of 1♣ there are those who might venture a thin 1♠ overcall on the East cards, and there are those who might compete as West after South's 1♠ response, possibly with a take-out double. North may also choose a more aggressive rebid than 2♣, some choosing 3♣, some an optimistic reverse of 2♥. It will be interesting to see the results on this one, but I predict that most scores will be penalties from failing contracts.</p>

East may well choose to open 1♦ rather than make some pre-emptive noise. If so, it's hard for East-West to avoid the contract of 4♥ – West may just blast that contact with such powerful trumps.</p> <p>Should 4♥ make? Yes, says <i>Deep Finesse</i> but then the computer can see all four hands. With a spade, diamond and club to lose, the whole hand depends on picking up the trumps for no loser. The odds suggest cashing the ♥AK, a play that would lead to defeat. Declarer needs to time the hand carefully, taking the heart finesse <i>en route</i>. Unlucky. Meanwhile, strong No Trumpers will open 1NT and play in that strain, some even reaching game.</p> <p>3NT is a ghastly contract with the prospect of losing at least three hearts and two aces, but the freakish layout of the heart suit means that the defenders cannot get to their winners. Best is to make a take-out double and followed by bidding No Trumps, showing a hand too strong to overcall 1NT. West is a tad too weak to make a stronger bid than a simple 1♥ response, but has to come to life after East shows 18-19 points. 2♦ is designed to show some muscle and West is easily able to justify a 4♠ raise after East admits to holding four of those. I wouldn't open that North hand in second seat, but many will. If North keeps shtum, East will open 1♣ and that should come back to North who can protect with 1♦. South can close proceedings with 1NT, where he may make as many as nine tricks unless East-West cash three spades, a diamond and a club.

Variations may come if North opens 1♦ and East overcalls 1NT. South may double that and take a useful penalty after a diamond lead. If East makes a take-out double of 1♦ the outcome of the auction is unclear, but North may end up in 2♦, making on the nose. Finally, it is possible that East opens 1NT in third seat. That should fail by two tricks after a spade lead, but may escape for one down if South sees fit to lead a club.

Who knows how this one will go? North will open 1♣ at all tables, surely, but then what? East will overcall 2♥ and now West has a problem. He may well pass that, allowing North to bid 2♠ and East to repeat his hearts. If West decides to show his fine seven-card suit, East may well bid 4♥, playing his partner for a better hand. The auction above is not actually recommended, it's just one that may well happen at some (many?) tables.

All-seeing *Deep Finesse* says 4♥ cannot make. True, oh mighty computer, but it takes a diamond lead to beat it. No mortal South is going to lead anything but the ♠2 and now East can win the ♠A, draw trumps, cash two top diamonds to pitch a club loser and set up the tenth trick in spades.

This hand may give North a nightmare in the bidding. After two passes, West does best to open 2♥, with pre-emption the order of the day opposite a passed partner. North has a far from ideal hand for a take-out double, but what is the alternative? East should raise the barrage with 3♥ (a contract which makes, incidentally) and that floats back around to North. What now? Another take-out double risks South bidding 3♠ on rubbish or, worse, jumping to 4♠ with some useful points but inadequate trumps. North might grit his teeth and pass, but that would be raising the white flag. A shot in the dark of 4♦ works well on this layout (4♣ would work even better!) and wins the coconut. It is, though, a quite horrible problem to get at the table.

A tricky hand, this one: East-West have a combined 25 points and have South's suit double-stopped. Nonetheless, against tight defence, 3NT should fail. The problem is the nasty club split combined with the ♦Q lying offside. After 1♥ is passed around to East, that player does best to jump to 3♣. In these protective positions, a simple overcall is often bid on the sniff of an oil rag. With genuine values it is often right to jump the bidding, allowing West to try his luck in 3NT.

After a heart lead, South does best to take the ♥K and switch to spades. Now there is no route to nine tricks for West.

This deal has echoes of Hand 7. East has 19 points and has an easy take-out double of North's 1♣ opening bid. South has nothing to say (did anyone raise clubs, vulnerable?) and West is a smidgeon away from a jump to 2♠. After the 1♠ response, East bids 1NT to show a balanced 18-19, or thereabouts, and West has enough now to insist on game. To do this, West can jump to 3♥, showing 5-4 in the majors and about 6-7 points, and East has an easy raise to game. 4♥ can be held to ten tricks by either a trump lead or the play of the ♣A and another club – declarer is unable to draw all the trumps and enjoy all five spades. A diamond lead or a spade lead, however, allows West to take two diamond ruffs in the West hand and make an overtrick. 4♣, though, is not affected by the 4-1 heart break and can always make eleven tricks.

East-West have a decent slam available on their cards, the play made especially easy by the 2-2 trump break. However, it is not easy to see a way to bid to 6♥ without specialised methods. Maybe the Strong Club adherents can find a route to get there, despite South getting in on the action? East will open 1♣ or 1♥ according to system or taste and South will surely overcall in spades (indeed, some may make a Michaels style two-suited overcall of 2♥ over 1♥ to show spades and a minor). In the auction above, South bids a modest 1♠, West's 2♠ shows a raise to 3♥ with genuine values and East, seeing many major-suit losers, contents himself with a game bid in hearts.

How many reached 6♥ on this one tonight? Congratulations if you did. A score of 1430 is sure to rake in at least 90% of the match-points.

A part-score battle with South likely to win it by declaring 3♦ and failing in his venture. Yes, *Deep Finesse* tells us that East-West can make 3♥, despite the 4-1 trump split, but that's not a contract many would care to tackle. West has an easy take-out double over 1♦ and East should really bid 2♥ rather than an insipid 1♥ with a five-card suit and useful shape. South is more or less obliged to try 3♦ now, and that should end the auction. West has no easy opening lead, so the fate of this contract is not clear. Obviously, by looking at all four hands, the defenders can take the first four tricks (♣A, club ruff, ♥A, club ruff) with a spade to come, but it may well not go like that at all. The scores here could be very varied.

With a combined 26 points and two balanced hands (more or less), there should be little problem in North-South reaching 3NT on this deal. Many will bid along lines indicated above; those who play a strong No Trump will start there and arrive in 3NT, probably via Stayman.

It's the play that is likely to prove challenging for South. West is surely going to lead the ♠Q, setting up three spade tricks for the defence. Now, with the heart finesse failing, South may well lose a club, a heart and three spades. However, if declarer plays three rounds of clubs, losing to East, and the defenders play on spades, West may be obliged to give South his ninth trick with the next lead.

*Deep Finesse*, of course, in its infinite wisdom, takes the ♠K, plays a diamond to the ♦J, a club to the ♣10 and racks up an overtrick.

A typical match-point pairs bunfight.

West opens 1♥ and North may well chance his arm with a dodgy take-out double ("Please don't choose diamonds, partner!"). After that, North-South compete in spades and East-West in diamonds, with 3♦ scooping the pool.

Provided that West plays trumps in the optimum fashion, leading low to the ♦8 (or equivalent), he can pick the suit up for one loser and make the contract for the loss of a trick in each suit.

Those who open 1♣ on the South cards will also play in clubs, but at what level is unclear. Those who open 1♠ may well play in 1NT, as in the auction above.</p> <p>After a diamond lead, North looks well placed to make a lot of tricks in No Trumps until the diabolical club break is exposed at trick two. Now North may be able to scramble seven tricks by setting up the long clubs, but the defenders may be able to defeat the contract.</p>

Two slams are available to East-West on this deal – the excellent 6♣ and the slightly dodgy 6NT by West. The latter needs the heart finesse for success; the former is cold on any lead or defence. Some may choose to open the West hand with 2NT; where this happens East will probably raise to 3NT making twelve tricks after a spade lead (or thirteen tricks if declarer risks the heart finesse). Where West opens 1♣, North will overcall 1♠ and East has the cards to justify raising to 3♣, probably via an unassuming cue-bid of 2♠. Now West can afford to employ Blackwood, being prepared to pass opposite no aces (unlikely) and to punt a slam opposite one ace. Sure, the hand may be off the ♥AK, but that isn't a likely prospect, and risks must be taken.

Although *Deep Finesse* says East-West can be held to eight tricks in hearts, it takes an initial trump lead (or the ♣K lead and a trump switch) to defeat 3♥.

Much depends on South's initial response to North's opening 1♥ bid. A full-blooded, pre-emptive raise to 4♥ wins the coconut here as West is surely going to be frozen out of the auction. Those who play a 3♥ raise as non-constructive may do even better, by stealing the deal at the three-level and recording a plus score. Where South makes a gentle raise to 2♥, West should find a way into the auction and may just find a route to 4♠. This one could be very interesting.

Yes, the omniscient *Deep Finesse* says that 4♥ is makeable and, with careful play, it is. However, it is phenomenally lucky to succeed and relies on great fortune in diamonds. A score of 140 to East-West, let alone 170 or 420, is going to score well for their side.


